REVIEW AND RETIREMENT OF THE DECISIONS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES

Proposals by the Executive Secretary pursuant to decision VII/33 on Operations of the Convention

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. At its seventh meeting, the Conference of the Parties, by paragraph 3 of decision VII/33, requested the Executive Secretary to make proposals to its eighth meeting regarding the retirement of decisions and elements of decisions taken at its fifth and sixth meetings and to communicate such proposals to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations at least six months prior to its eighth meeting. In paragraph 5 of the same decision, the Conference of the Parties invited Parties, Governments and international organizations to submit to the Executive Secretary written comments on the proposals referred to in paragraph 3 of the decision at least three months prior to its eighth meeting.
- 2. The Executive Secretary has prepared the present document pursuant to paragraph 3 of decision VII/33. The document is divided into two sections and contains three annexes. Section II describes the process of review of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth and sixth meetings.
- 3. In accordance with paragraphs 3 and 5 of decision VII/33, the Executive Secretary, by a notification dated 30 May 2005, communicated the proposals relating to the review and consolidation of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations. Comments were received from Canada, India, Poland, Thailand and UNEP-WCMC. Except for the submission from India, these comments focused on the proposals relating to the consolidation of decisions of the Conference of the Parties pursuant to paragraph 4 of decision VII/33 (see document UNEP/CBD/COP/8/16/Add.2). The comments of India were taken into consideration in the finalization of the present document.

II. REVIEW AND RETIREMENT OF DECISIONS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES

4. The full review of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth and sixth meetings is contained in annex I to the present document. The review follows the same format that was adopted for the purposes of the reviews undertaken for the sixth and seventh meetings of the Conference of the Parties (see UNEP/CBD/COP/6/INF/17 and UNEP/CBD/COP/7/INF/16). On the basis of this review, the Executive Secretary, in annex II to the present document identifies: (a) decisions and elements of decisions that could be retired by the Conference of the Parties at its eighth meeting because they either have been fully implemented and are of no continuing relevance or effect; have been superseded by subsequent decisions; or are of only historical value; and (b) decisions and elements of decisions that could be retained and subsequently consolidated with other relevant decisions because they are either still under implementation or are of continuing relevance or effect. Annex III contains the list of decisions and elements of decisions that the Conference of the Parties may, at its eighth meeting, consider retiring.

Annex I

REVIEW OF THE DECISIONS ADOPTED AT THE FIFTH AND SIXTH MEETINGS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES AND STATUS OF THEIR IMPLEMENTATION

A. Fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties

DECISION V/1: WORK PLAN OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE FOR THE CARTAGENA PROTOCOL ON BIOSAFETY

Overview of the decision

The decision approves a work plan for the Intergovernmental Committee for the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (ICCP), an interim arrangement established by decision EM-I/3 of the extraordinary meeting of the Conference of the Parties, to undertake the preparations necessary for the first meeting of the Parties to the Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

Since ICCP ceased to exist upon the convening of the first meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Protocol (COP-MOP) from 23-27 February 2004, this decision will have only historical significance. Hence, the entire decision could be retired.

DECISION V/2: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON THE BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY OF INLAND WATER ECOSYSTEMS (IMPLEMENTATION OF DECISION IV/4)

Overview of the decision

The decision reviews the implementation of the programme of work on biodiversity of inland water ecosystems adopted by decision IV/4; endorses the joint work plan between the CBD and the Ramsar Convention for the period 2000-2001; and mandates SBSTTA to provide advice on the further refinement of the programme of work.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

A revised programme of work was adopted at the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VII/4). A third joint work plan (2002-2006) with the Ramsar Convention was endorsed at the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VI/20). The River Basin Initiative is on-going.

Overview of the Decision

The decision reviews the implementation of the programme of work adopted at the fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision IV/5)

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision has largely been superseded by decision VII/5 which endorsed an elaborated programme of work on marine and coastal biodiversity. The Conference of the Parties may wish to retire this decision.

DECISION V/4: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK FOR FOREST BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Overview of the Decision

The decision established the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group on Forest Biological Diversity to assist SBSTTA in its work on forest biological diversity and, in particular, to provide advice on scientific programmes and international cooperation in research and development related to the conservation and

sustainable use of forest biological diversity and to review information on status and trends. The decision also provided a framework for cooperation and the development of synergies with the UNFCCC and its Kyoto Protocol on forest-related issues.

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision has been largely superseded by decision VI/22 which adopted an expanded programme of work on forest biological diversity on the basis of the work of the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group and SBSTTA. The whole decision, except its paragraph 16, could be retired. Paragraph 16 should be consolidated with other decisions.

DECISION V/11: ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL RESOURCES

Overview of the decision

This decision focuses on the collection and dissemination of financial data through CHM and other means, engagement of funding institutions and development agencies as well as other donors, and national funding measures. This emphasis is specifically pronounced for capacity building for the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The requests to the Executive Secretary were implemented and reported to the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. Other stakeholders have probably implemented relevant requests as well. But since this is the first comprehensive decision on financial resources, many elements of the decisions will remain operational and thus merit further consolidation.

The emphasis for additional and adequate financial resources specific to the Biosafety Protocol would obviously remain standing. The Cartagena Protocol has now entered into force. Paragraphs 1 (a-d) and 2-5 of the decision could be retired. The contents of paragraph 1 (e) should be reflected in a future decision on impact assessment at which point the entire section relating to article 14(1) could be retired.

- (d) Tangible benefits to the local economies, such as job creation and the sharing of benefits arising from the sustainable use of biological diversity for tourism purposes. In this regard, small and medium-sized enterprises can play a major role;
- (e) The need to develop sustainable tourism which is an important mechanism for the conservation and sustainable use of biological diversity, and to meet the expectations of all stakeholders, while encouraging responsible behaviour on the part of tourists and the tourist industry, tourism enterprises and the local population;
- (f) Awareness-raising, information-sharing, education and training of tourism operators and their staff and sensitization of tourists on biological diversity issues and technical and capacity-building at the local level, which enhance the goal of the respect and the conservation of biological diversity and its sustainable use:
- (g) The fact that in order to contribute to the sustainable use of biological diversity through tourism, there is a need to implement a flexible mix of instruments, such as integrated planning, multistakeholder dialogue that includes indigenous peoples, zoning in land-use planning, environmental impact assessment, strategic environmental assessment, standards, industry performance-recognition programmes, recognized accreditation bodies, ecolabelling, codes of good practice, environmental management and audit systems, economic instruments, indicators and limits regarding the carrying capacity of the natural areas;
- (h) The importance of the involvement and the need for the participation of indigenous and local communities and their interface with other sectors in the development and management of tourism, as well as their monitoring and assessment, including of cultural and spiritual impacts;
- (i) The importance of the understanding of the values and knowledge of use of biological diversity held by the indigenous

Overview of the decision

The decision established a process for the review of Article 14, paragraph 2, of the Convention. It requested the Executive Secretary to convene a group of legal and technical experts and specified its mandate.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The group did not meet during the inter-sessional period between COP 6 & 7 due to funding problems. COP 7 renewed the request contained in decision VI/11. The Group held its meeting in Montreal from 12-14 October 2005 and made recommendations for the consideration of COP 8 (see document UNEP/CBD/COP/8/27/Add. 3). COP 8 may wish to consider whether this decision could be retired taking into account the outcome of the meeting of the Group.

DECISION VI/20: COOPERATION WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS, INITIATIVES AND CONVENTIONS

Overview of the decision

This is a decision that calls for cooperation with a number of other conventions, organizations and other processes. The one on World Trade Organization (WTO) recognizes the need for cooperation with the organization with a view to ensuring mutual supportiveness between the Biosafety Protocol and the relevant WTO agreements, in particular with the Agreement on Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SPS) and the Agreement on Technical Barriers to Trade (TBT). In fact, the decision requests the Executive Secretary to apply to WTO for an observer status in the Committees of the two agreements. The decision encourages also cooperation with the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC).

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision still stands. The Executive Secretary is under regular contact with the WTO with a view to get the request for an observer status in the SPS and the TBT accepted by the relevant committees. The cooperation with IPPC as regards matters related to the Biosafety Protocol is also underway. Therefore, those elements of the decision that involve cooperation with the WTO and IPPC regarding matters related to the Biosafety Protocol are not only being implemented, but they also continue to have relevance in the future.

The decision adopts the Bonn Guidelines on Access to Genetic Resources and Fair and Equitable Sharing of the Benefits Arising Out of Their Utilization. It also addresses the issue of capacity building for ABS and establishes a process for the development of an Action Plan for Capacity Building. It further addresses the issue of the role of intellectual property rights in the implementation of ABS arrangements.

A large component of the elements of the decision remain relevant and should be incorporated in a consolidated decision on ABS. The elements relating to the process of developing an Action Plan for capacity-building could be retired since COP 7 adopted an Action Plan through its decision VII/19F.
