PROPOSALS ON THE RETIREMENT OF DECISIONS TAKEN BY THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES AT ITS FIFTH MEETING

Proposals by the Executive Secretary pursuant to decision VIII/10 on Operations of the Convention

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. In section V paragraph 36 of decision VIII/10, the Conference of the Parties, *inter alia*, requested the Executive Secretary to make proposals to its ninth meeting regarding the retirement of decisions and elements of decisions taken at its fifth meeting and to communicate such proposals to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations at least six months prior to its ninth meeting. By paragraph 37 of the same decision, Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations were invited to submit to the Executive Secretary written comments on the proposals at least three months prior to its ninth meeting.
- 2. In accordance with paragraphs 36 and 37 of decision VIII/10, the Executive Secretary, by a notification dated 20 November 2007, communicated the proposals to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations. Comments were received from the European Community. These comments were taken into consideration in the document's finalization
- 3. The document is divided into two sections and contains two annexes. Section II describes the process to review the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth meeting.

II. REVIEW AND RETIREMENT OF DECISIONS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES

4. The full review of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth meeting is contained in annex I. The review follows the same format that was adopted for earlier reviews undertaken for the sixth and seventh meetings of the Conference of the Parties (see UNEP/CBD/COP/6/INF/17 and UNEP/CBD/COP/7/INF/16). On the basis of this review, the Secretariat, in annex II identifies decisions and elements of decisions that could be retired by the Conference of the Parties because they either have been fully implemented and are of no continuing relevance or effect; have been superseded by subsequent decisions; or are only of historical value

Annex I

REVIEW OF THE DECISIONS ADOPTED AT THE FIFTH MEETING OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES AND STATUS OF THEIR IMPLEMENTATION

DECISION V/1: WORK PLAN OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE FOR THE CARTAGENA PROTOCOL ON BIOSAFETY

Overview of the decision

The decision approves a work plan for the Intergovernmental Committee for the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (ICCP), an interim arrangement established by decision EM-I/3 of the extraordinary meeting of the Conference of the Parties, to undertake the preparations necessary for the first meeting of the Parties to the Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

Since ICCP ceased to exist upon the convening of the first meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Protocol (COP-MOP) from 23-27 February 2004, this decision will have only historical significance. Hence, the entire decision could be retired.

DECISION V/2: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON THE BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY OF INLAND WATER ECOSYSTEMS (IMPLEMENTATION OF DECISION IV/4)

Overview of the decision

The decision reviews the implementation of the programme of work on biodiversity of inland water ecosystems adopted by decision IV/4; endorses the joint work plan between the CBD and the Ramsar Convention for the period 2000-2001; and mandates SBSTTA to provide advice on the further refinement of the programme of work.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

A revised programme of work was adopted at the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VII/4). A third joint work plan (2002-2006) with the Ramsar Convention was endorsed at the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VI/20). The River Basin Initiative is ongoing.

DECISION V/4: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK FOR FOREST BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Overview of the decision

The decision established the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group on Forest Biological Diversity to assist SBSTTA in its work on forest biological diversity and, in particular, to provide advice on scientific programmes and international cooperation in research and development related to the conservation and sustainable use of forest biological diversity and to review information on status and trends. The decision

also provided a framework for cooperation and the development of synergies with the UNFCCC and its Kyoto Protocol on forest-related issues.

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision has been largely superseded by decision VI/22 that adopted an expanded programme of work on forest biological diversity on the basis of the work of the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group and SBSTTA. The whole decision, except its paragraph 16, could be retired.

This emphasis is specifically pronounced for capacity building for the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The requests to the Executive Secretary were implemented and reported to the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. Other stakeholders have probably implemented relevant requests as well. But since this is the first comprehensive decision on financial resources, many elements of the decisions will remain operational and thus merit further consolidation.

The emphasis for additional and adequate financial resources specific to the Biosafety Protocol would obviously remain standing. The Cartagena Protocol has now entered into force. An Action Plan for Building Capacities for the Effective Implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety has been adopted by the first meeting of COP-MOP. As a result, similar calls for additional financial resources have been and will be made by COP-MOP. The decision may have no immediate significance any more but the objective of emphasizing the need for additional financial resources through the financial mechanisms always stands.

As regards, liability and redress the decision renewed the invitation for submission of information by Governments; welcomed the offer of the Government of France to organize a workshop; and decided to consider at COP 6 a process for reviewing Article 14(2), including the establishment of a group of experts.

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

In section I paragraphs 1 (a-e) and 2-9 of the decision could be retired.

In section II paragraphs 6-9 on liability and redress have been superseded by decision VI/11 that established the Group of Legal and Technical Experts and defined its mandate and decision VII/17.
