CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE REGIONAL WORKSHOP ON THE REVIEW OF PROGRESS AND CAPACITY-BUILDING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON PROTECTED AREAS UNDER THE CONVENTION ON BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Isle of Vilm, Germany, 27 November-1 December 2009

ANNOTATIONS TO THE PROVISIONAL AGENDA

INTRODUCTION

- 1. In the first preamble paragraph of decision IX/18 A - review of implementation of the programme of work on protected areas, the Conference of Parties (COP) welcomed the progress made by Parties in implementing the programme of work on protected areas (PoWPA) at national, regional and subregional levels including using mechanisms of effective consultation and participation with all partners and noted that further efforts are needed to achieve the 2010 and 2012 biodiversity target for terrestrial and marine protected areas, respectively, and other targets set in the programme of work on protected areas. In paragraph 15 of this decision the Conference of the Parties requested the Executive Secretary to convene regional and subregional capacity-building and progress-review workshops for the programme of work on protected areas. In paragraph 25 of the same decision, the Conference of the Parties, while deciding on the process for preparation of in-depth review of the programme of work on protected areas at the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties, requested the Executive Secretary to prepare the in-depth review using, inter alia, information contained in the fourth national reports, relevant global and regional data bases and the results of the above-mentioned regional and subregional workshops and to propose ways and means for strengthening the implementation of the programme of work on protected areas for consideration by the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice (SBSTTA).
- 2. Accordingly, the Executive Secretary, with the generous financial assistance of the European Commission, the Government of, Germany and in collaboration with the International Academy for Nature Conservation, Isle of Vilm and WWF, is organizing a regional workshop for Central and Eastern Europe on the review of progress and capacity-building for the implementation of the programme of work on protected areas, to be held from 27 November to 1 December 2009 in Isle of Vilm, Germany.
- 3. The objectives of the workshop are:
- (i) To strengthen the skills and knowledge of protected area functionaries and others who implement the programme of work through an exchange of experiences, sharing of tools, available

resources and capacity-building in two aspects of the programme of work on protected areas, (a) integration of protected areas into wider land and seascapes, and (b) governance;

- (ii) To review progress made in implementation of the programme of work on protected areas at subregional and regional levels, including identification of constraints and opportunities to promote implementation; and
- (iii) Inputs to the fourteenth meeting of the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice, to be held in May 2010 on the in-depth review of the programme of work on protected areas, including proposing ways and means for strengthening the implementation and the programme of work on protected areas post-2010.
- 4. A list of documents for the workshop is attached as annex I.
- 5. The Secretariat is issuing an information note for participants containing details of logistical arrangements, including information on travel, visa requirements, accommodation and other matters for the workshop. The language of the workshop will be English with simultaneous translation in Russian.
- 6. Registration of participants will commence at 5.30 p.m. on Friday 27 November 2009.

ITEM 1. OPENING OF THE MEETING AND ORGANIZATIONAL MATTERS

- 7. A representative of the Executive Secretary of the Convention on Biological Diversity will open the meeting at 6 pm. on Friday, 27 November 2009. A representative of the International Academy for Nature Conservation, Isle of Vilm will also welcome the participants.
- 8. After a brief self-introduction by the participants, the workshop will elect its Chair based on proposals from the floor. Participants will then be invited to consider the provisional agenda prepared by the Executive Secretary (UNEP/CBD/WS-PA/A/1/1), adopt it following any amendments, if needed, and consider the proposed organization of work for the meeting as contained in annex II below.
- 9. As a complement to the consideration of the organization of the work and to set the tone of the workshop, the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity will describe the purpose and expected outputs of the workshop. The workshop will be organized around a hands-on learning programme designed to address key framing questions in technical sessions.

ITEM 2. STRENGTHENING CAPACITIES FOR (I) INTEGRATING PROTECTED AREAS INTO WIDER LAND AND SEA SCAPES; AND (II) GOVERNNACE

- 10. Under this item, the workshop will provide practical hands-on tools and training on two: (i) integration of protected areas into wider land and seascapes, and (ii) governance. Each theme is structured into (i) general introduction, review of critical steps and tools and review of status of implementation; (ii) country-specific case-studies; and (iii) country breakout groups for interactive sessions to exchange ideas and prepare country-specific future work plans including regional strategies for addressing key issues. In the interactive sessions, the participants will be provided with key framing questions for each topic to come up with a description of the current state and a future plan of action. A rapporteur from each country group will make a presentation on the outcome of the interactive sessions to the plenary.
- 11. Goal 1.2 of the programme of work on protected areas specifically calls for integrating protected areas into broader land and seascapes and sectors to maintain the structural and functional viability of ecosystems. While reviewing the implementation of the programme of work on protected areas the Conference of the Parties, in decision VIII/24 recognized that there was a lack of implementation in goal 1.2 in developing countries due to capacity building constraints. In paragraph 4 (a) of decision

IX/18 A, the Conference of the Parties invited Parties to promote the application of appropriate tools and policy measures including, as appropriate, integrated spatial planning in order to better integrate protected areas into broader land and seascapes and relevant sectors and plans, including aiming at poverty eradication. To address capacity-building constraints and to promote the application of appropriate tools and measures for integration of protected areas into wider land and seascapes, the Secretariat has developed a guide. Hard copies of the guide will be made available to the workshop participants. The capacity-building session on this topic will follow the structure described in the guide.

- 12. Programme element 2 of the programme of work on protected areas calls for a number of actions related to protected area governance issues, including ensuring participation of indigenous and local communities and other stakeholders, initiating measures for equity in benefit sharing, respecting rights and recognizing responsibilities of indigenous and local communities and promoting a broad set of governance types. While reviewing the implementation of the programme of work on protected areas, in decision IX/18, the Conference of the Parties invited Parties to give special attention to the implementation of programme element 2 of the programme of work on protected areas, to diversify and strengthen protected-area governance types and to recognize co-managed protected areas, private protected areas and indigenous and local community conserved areas within the national protected area system. The capacity-building session on this topic will provide a framework for assessing implementation of these issues, provide opportunities to countries to showcase innovative ways and come up with a broad roadmap for enhanced implementation.
- 13. Participants will be provided with a CD-ROM of all the presentations and documents for the workshop, including information on critical steps, tools, available resources, case-studies and web links to online resources and tools, for the two themes.

ITEM 3. TO REVIEW OF PROGRESS MADE IN IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON PROTECTED AREAS AT NATIONAL SUBREGIONAL AND REGIONAL LEVELS, FOR THE INDEPTH REVIEW

- 14. In paragraph 1 of decision IX/18 A, the Conference of the Parties recognized that the limited availability of information continues to be a major shortcoming for the purpose of review exercises. In paragraph 25 of the same decision, the Conference of the Parties requested the Executive Secretary to prepare the in-depth review of the programme of work on protected areas using, *inter alia*, information contained in the fourth national reports, relevant global and regional data bases and the results of the regional and subregional workshops and to propose ways and means for strengthening the implementation of the programme of work on protected areas for consideration by the SBSTTA prior to the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. Accordingly under this agenda item, participants are invited to describe the status of implementation of the programme of work in their country, focusing on progress made in achieving the targets of each goal and challenges/obstacles.
- Based upon appendix 3.II of 65 fourth national reports to the Convention on Biological Diversity and available global and regional information, the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity, prepared a report on global progress in achieving the goals of the programme of work on protected areas. The progress in each goal at global level is described on a five scale notation: very little progress; some progress; fair progress; ood progress; • excellent progress. This document will be available to the workshop as an information document. The Secretariat will make a presentation on the global progress under this item. In addition, in response to paragraph 10 of decision IX/18 A, the Secretariat in consultation with UNEP-WCMC, IUCN-WCPA and others has also developed a simple format for streamlined and uniform reporting. This reporting format will also made available to the workshop participants to assess the status of implementation in their countries. In addition the participants are requested to provide at least one case-study or best example on how they implemented any goal of the programme of work on protected areas and share their experiences.
- 16. In breakout groups participants will assess progress in each goal of the programme of work on protected areas at country and subregional levels, identify major gaps in implementation to date, key

obstacles and challenges, priorities and next steps for each country. A rapporteur from each country group will make a presentation on the outcome of the interactive sessions to the plenary.

ITEM 4. INPUTS TO THE FOURTEENTH MEETING OF THE SUBSIDIARY BODY ON SCIENTIFIC TECHNICAL AND TECHNOLOGICAL ADVICE TO BE HELD IN MAY 2010 ON THE IN-DEPTH REVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON PROTECTED AREAS

- 17. In paragraph 24 of decision IX/18 A, the Conference of the Parties invited IUCN to contribute to the process of the programme of work on protected areas review and to the ways and means to strengthen implementation of the programme of work on protected areas. Accordingly IUCN in collaboration with the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity is organizing an international workshop in Jeju island, South Korea on the future of the programme of work on protected areas. The outcome of this workshop will be made available to the workshop participants.
- 18. Under this item, based upon presentations in agenda item 3, and the outcome of the Jeju workshop, participants are invited to discuss and draft, as a region, what inputs they would like to present to SBSTTA, what they expect from it, and the Conference of the Parties in terms of strengthening implementation of the programme of work on protected areas and the future of the programme of work on protected areas beyond 2010.

ITEM 5. OTHER MATTERS

19. Any other matters will be considered under this agenda item.

ITEM 6. ADOPTION OF THE REPORT AND CLOSURE OF THE MEETING

- 20. The workshop will be invited to consider and adopt its report on the basis of a draft report to be prepared and presented by the Chair.
- 21. The workshop is expected to be closed at 12 noon on Tuesday 1 December 2009.
