## NOTIFICATION

Capacity-building workshop for South America on ecosystem conservation and restoration to support achievement of the Aichi Biodiversity Targets

Linhares, Brazil, 24 to 28 March 2014

Dear Madam/Sir,

I have the pleasure to announce that the Secretariat is organizing, in collaboration with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), a capacity-building workshop for South America on ecosystem conservation and restoration to support achievement of the Aichi Biodiversity Targets to be held from 24 to 28 March 2014 in Linhares, Brazil. This workshop is part of a series being organized through the generous financial assistance of the Government of Japan (through the Japan Biodiversity Fund). The aim of the workshop is to support Parties in:

- (a) The development of national targets and plans for ecosystem conservation and restoration within the framework of Aichi Biodiversity Targets 5, 11 and 15;
- (b) The integration of these targets and plans into updated NBSAPs and mainstreaming into broader national policies, plans and programmes (in particular for PoWPA action plans with respect to decision X/31 (paragraph 1 (c)); and
- (c) The use of appropriate assessment, policy and planning tools to promote ecosystem conservation and restoration at appropriate levels.

Aichi Biodiversity Targets 5, 11 and 15 set quantitative global targets to reduce the loss of natural habitats, restore degraded areas and improve protected area networks. Target 5 calls for the rate of loss of natural habitats to be at least halved; Target 11 calls for the protection of at least 17 per cent of terrestrial and inland waters and 10 per cent of coastal and marine areas; and Target 15 calls for the restoration of at least 15 per cent of degraded ecosystems. There is a need for a coherent approach to the achievement of these targets, including as they contribute toward, or depend on, achieving many other Aichi Targets (e.g. Targets 7, 12, 13, 14 and 18). The Secretariat plans to offer capacity-building to Parties within an integrated, participatory, approach to promote holistic planning and implementation at landscape level. The overall approach includes providing background information to Parties to facilitate work prior to and during sub-regional workshops, as well as facilitating follow up support to Parties with the cooperation of partner agencies and initiatives.

These capacity-building activities respond to multiple requests from the Conference of the Parties (COP) to the Executive Secretary including: paragraph 10 of decision XI/24 which requested the

continued support for implementation of national action plans for the programme of work on protected areas (PoWPA), including through workshops and making available relevant tools; and paragraph 5 of decision XI/16 wherein the COP requested the Executive Secretary, making use of information documents UNEP/CBD/COP/11/INF/17, 18 and 19, to conduct capacity-building workshops on ecosystem restoration. Further, these activities will enable the Secretariat to report to the twelfth meeting of the COP on progress by Parties in integrating PoWPA action plans into revised national biodiversity strategies and action plans (NBSAPs) and into relevant sectoral plans and budgets as invited in paragraph 1 (c) of decision X/31.

I am pleased to invite your Government to nominate <u>two representatives</u>, as soon as possible but not later than **10 January 2014**, to participate in the workshop. The Secretariat will be in a position to finance the participation of two representatives from eligible Parties. Parties are requested to use the following criteria when submitting their nominations:

- (a) Participants must have experience in spatial planning for biodiversity, such as the protected area focal point, and/or be responsible for land-use/spatial planning for forestry, agricultural or marine, as well as be knowledgeable about their countries' NBSAP;
- (b) All participants must be in a position to translate the knowledge gained into concrete actions;
- (c) All participants must be capable of reporting on the current status of achieving the area-based Aichi Targets (5, 11 and 15), providing an assessment of needs, and liaising with key partners to facilitate support for follow up actions; and
- (d) Participants should be able to work in Spanish.

Another participant from each country, an expert in forest and rangeland management, will be invited through FAO. In the weeks leading up to the workshop, the participants will be provided background information and data as well as a template and asked to submit information on the status of restoration and conservation activities in their countries. Participants will also be offered the opportunity to benefit from online modules on key workshop themes, including protected areas. The capacity gained can be shared with staff in country who may also take these modules.

Nominations of the two delegates must include full contact details (except in the case of CBD or protected area focal points) and be accompanied by a *curriculum vitae* clearly indicating the areas of expertise of the nominees. CBD national focal points should provide the name and contact details of their nominees through an official signed letter addressed to the Executive Secretary via faxed to +1 (514) 288-6588, or scanned and sent by e-mail to <a href="mailto:secretariat@cbd.int">secretariat@cbd.int</a>. This workshop will be held in Spanish.

I look forward to receiving your nominations and I thank you for your cooperation and continued support for the work of the Convention.
