Humble beginnings

- Seychelles & the International Coral Reef Initiative (2002-2004)
- Engagement in WSSD (2002) and BPOA+10 (2004)
- Significant weaknesses in SIDS Strategy
- Too little focus on biodiversity issues
- SIDS needed leadership from within
- GLISPA gestation using ICRI platform

Birth of a global mandate for action

- In Mauritius, President Michel (Seychelles) and President Remengesau (Palau) invite Kofi Annan to make a statement on coral reefs and both call for a Global Island Partnership (GLISPA)
- GLISPA grows with buy-in from SIDS leaders and global leaders (SG UN, CEO GEF, ED UNEP, CEO TNC, CEO WFF, etc. and many developed countries – EU, Italy, UK, France, New Zealand
- Development of CBD Island Biodiversity Programme of Work
