The Equator Initiative recognizes and advances local sustainable development solutions for people, nature and resilient communities. In the newly launched publication *The Power of Local Action: Lessons from 10 Years of the Equator Prize*, the Equator Initiative presents 12 key lessons on successful community-based action for the environment and development. One of these lessons is that 'communication is a powerful agent of behavior change'.
