Part 1: General comments	
1.	The mandate for the draft Strategy is missing and should be included to clarify where this particular item of work is coming from – is the mandate coming from the CBD/COP/DEC/15/16 Knowledge management and the clearing-house mechanism?
2.	The draft Strategy, in several ways, is unclear because it does not explain if the focus of the strategy is more related to technical and scientific cooperation under the relevant articles of the CBD or if it is focusing on traditional knowledge and Indigenous Peoples and local communities. If this Strategy is targeted towards Indigenous Peoples and local communities, it would be helpful to include a greater narrative to strengthen these links. For example, there could be proposed targeted statements across all sections that are focused on Indigenous Peoples and local communities.
3.	We suggest further clarifying how this draft Strategy would work with or is connected to Target 21 of the GBF and GBF monitoring framework. Currently, there is only one introductory reference to Target 21.
4.	There are a significant number of actions directed at Parties, but the draft is not clear that the Strategy would be voluntary, referring to implementation as “appropriate, by Governments, indigenous peoples and local communities and relevant stakeholders...” While some tasks are no doubt useful, we have concerns about the additional reporting burdens and the challenges for developing countries that may not have the resources to implement these actions in the draft Strategy. The role of the Secretariat is also not clear.

<p>If the draft Strategy is voluntary, the nature of this should be clearly stated.</p>
<p>5. Under the <i>Scoping and Framing of the Situation and the Needs</i>, the draft mentions “Map existing knowledge, knowledge holders, curators and sources relevant to the KMGBF and NBSAPs”.</p> <p>There may be challenges with this aspiration as in the Australian context this is not a homogenous process, with hundreds of nations all doing things differently according to their interests regarding this aspiration. Ensuring this process is co-designed with Indigenous Peoples and local communities would be a key factor.</p>
<p>6. There are many obligations on Indigenous Peoples without consideration of resourcing and support to implement and/or meet these obligations.</p>
<p>7. We suggest there should be more guidance on how Parties should work with Indigenous Peoples and local communities, as this is currently missing in the draft Strategy.</p>

37	At the end of the sentence ADD: “Additionally, empowering indigenous peoples and local communities to practice traditional knowledge on their traditional territories should be regarded as essential to knowledge sharing for conservation and sustainable use.”
44	We note there is no mention of traditional knowledge in IV. Purpose. Is the Strategy’s purpose to focus on knowledge or traditional knowledge.
78-83	This paragraph is not clear on how those actions would be taken and any associated financial implications. Need to ensure this links back to the Strategy’s broader knowledge management purpose under the Convention as a whole.
90-91	We suggest relevant decisions should be quoted here.
96	Referring to 12-15, if this Strategy is referring to traditional knowledge, we suggest changing the word “consider” to “prioritize”. “The strategy will also consider [Add: prioritize] the need to engage...”
97	To ensure language is consistent throughout the CBD, GBF, and the Article 8(j) glossary, we suggest rewording the following. DEL: “...the need to engage indigenous people, local communities... ” ADD: “...the need to engage indigenous peoples and local communities,...”
102-104	We note the use of “may” in the sentence. However, we suggest making it clearer if this would be voluntary, as it may be a reporting burden, especially for developing countries.

1 **Draft knowledge management strategy to support the implementation of**
 2 **the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework***

3 **I. Background and context**

4 1. Knowledge management is one of the key strategic means of implementation that will
 5 underpin the achievement of the goals and targets of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity
 6 Framework (KM-GBF), as recognized in Target 21¹ and section K of the [KM-GBF Framework](#).

7 2. The knowledge management strategy supports the effective implementation of the [KM-GBF](#)
 8 [Framework](#) and complements its monitoring framework, the long-term strategic framework for
 9 capacity-building and development, the technical and scientific cooperation mechanism and the
 10 clearing-house mechanisms of the Convention and the [Clearing Houses of its Protocols](#).

11 **II. Components**

12 3. Knowledge management encompasses a range of processes, strategies and practices through
 13 which biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge are generated and collected; organized,
 14 curated, stored and shared; and used or applied to achieve biodiversity conservation-related
 15 objectives and outcomes.

16 4. The strategy recognizes the four interdependent components of knowledge management,
 17 namely: (a) people, including various actors, such as knowledge holders, indigenous peoples and
 18 local communities, managers, curators and users; (b) processes, that is, the relevant procedures,
 19 standards and policies; (c) technology, including the technological tools, systems and platforms; and
 20 (d) content, that is, biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge, including how it is
 21 managed, for example through cataloguing, tagging and indexing, digitization and organization.

22 **III. Principles**

23 5. The strategy recognizes that, to contribute to the achievement of the goals and targets of the
 24 Framework, it is important for data, information and knowledge, [as well as including](#) the traditional
 25 knowledge, innovations and practices of indigenous peoples and local communities that are made
 26 available with their free, prior and informed consent,² to be available and accessible in a timely
 27 manner to decision makers, practitioners and the public, as well as to the Intergovernmental Science-
 28 Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services to be considered, as appropriate, in the
 29 development of various assessments of biodiversity and ecosystem services. It is also important for
 30 knowledge to be fit for purpose in terms of content and format of transmission.

31 6. Furthermore, it is important for Parties, other Governments and stakeholders to foster a culture
 32 of knowledge-sharing, continuous learning from experience, and knowledge retention and re-use to
 33 improve implementation processes and practices.

* This draft knowledge management strategy to support the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework is the draft strategy that incorporates the review by the Ad Hoc Open-ended Intersessional Working Group on Article 8(j) and Related Provisions of the Convention on Biological Diversity at its twelfth meeting, as contained in the annex to the Working Group's recommendation 12/3 ([CBD/WG8/REC/12/3](#)), with editorial improvement provided to paragraphs 5 and 13 and a section heading provided to the table on strategic objectives, actions and actors.

¹ Ensure that the best available data, information and knowledge are accessible to decision makers, practitioners and the public to guide effective and equitable governance and the integrated and participatory management of biodiversity, and to strengthen communication, awareness-raising, education, monitoring, research and knowledge management and, also in this context, traditional knowledge, innovations, practices and technologies of indigenous peoples and local communities should only be accessed with their free, prior and informed consent, in accordance with national legislation.

34 7. The strategy also recognizes that effective knowledge management requires acknowledging
 35 and optimizing the contributions of various governmental and non-governmental institutions,
 36 regional and international organizations, researchers, practitioners, indigenous peoples and local
 37 communities and relevant stakeholders to promote diverse and inclusive knowledge societies.

38 8. The strategy promotes the principles of findability, accessibility, interoperability and
 39 reusability, with a view to promoting the open sharing of data, information and knowledge.

40 9. In addition, in order to ensure that access to the traditional knowledge, innovations, practices
 41 and technologies of indigenous peoples and local communities is given with their free, prior and
 42 informed consent, the strategy also promotes the principles of collective benefit, authority to control
 43 by indigenous peoples and local communities, responsibility, reciprocity and ethics.

44 **IV. Purpose**

45 10. The strategy is aimed at addressing some of the challenges and needs identified by Parties in
 46 order to facilitate the effective implementation of the Framework and related decisions of the
 47 Conference of the Parties, including by achieving the following:

48 (a) Addressing disparities in data and information availability and accessibility across
 49 countries, and the barriers to the effective use of existing biodiversity-related data, information and
 50 knowledge, taking into account the specific challenges faced by developing countries and countries
 51 with economies in transition;

52 (b) Strengthening national and, as appropriate, subnational capacities, systems and
 53 mechanisms for biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge management to support
 54 evidence-based decision-making and action, and for the monitoring and reporting of progress
 55 towards the achievement of national targets as contributions to the goals and targets of the
 56 Framework;

57 (c) Increasing the level of standardization for greater harmonization and interoperability
 58 among national and regional biodiversity information systems, tools and platforms, so that data can
 59 flow seamlessly to support planning, implementation, monitoring and reporting;

60 (d) Developing appropriate national policies and strategies to support the generation of data
 61 and information and knowledge management;

62 (e) Enhancing coordination and collaboration among various biodiversity knowledge
 63 initiatives, tools and platforms to avoid their duplication and foster efficiency and sustainability;

64 (f) Leveraging existing biodiversity knowledge management initiatives and networks by
 65 bridging the gaps that prevent their full and effective usage, and enhancing coordination and
 66 collaboration among them, including by enhancing synergies among biodiversity-related
 67 conventions to facilitate more coordinated national reporting, in line with their respective mandates,
 68 legal authority and responsibilities;

69 (g) Strengthening the capacities of developing countries and countries with economies in
 70 transition for the generation of biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge.

71 11. Ultimately, the strategy is aimed at enhancing the accessibility and use of relevant data,
 72 information and knowledge, including traditional knowledge given access to with the free, prior and
 73 informed consent of indigenous peoples and local communities, for informed policy development,
 74 planning, decision-making and action to support the implementation and monitoring of the
 75 Framework at all levels. It is also aimed at strengthening communication, awareness-raising,
 76 education, capacity development, knowledge-sharing and organizational learning.

77 **V. Outcomes**

78 12. The implementation of the strategy is expected to result in: the increased capacity of
 79 Governments, indigenous peoples and local communities and relevant stakeholders to capture,
 80 manage and use biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge; an expanded knowledge base;
 81 and the increased availability, accessibility and uptake of relevant data, information and knowledge
 82 at all levels, with a view to facilitating evidence-based programming and policy design, informed
 83 decision-making and the effective implementation and monitoring of the Framework.

84 13. The strategic objectives, component actions and main actors to achieve those outcomes are
 85 listed in the table in section VIII, below.

86 **VI. Implementation**

87 14. The strategy will be implemented, as appropriate, by Governments, indigenous peoples
 88 and local communities and relevant stakeholders, including subnational governments, cities, other
 89 local authorities and the private sector, with support from the Secretariat, in line with the priorities
 90 outlined in the national biodiversity strategies and action plans, the Framework and relevant decisions
 91 of the Conference of the Parties [such as The global mechanism and the regional and/or sub-regional
 92 technical and scientific cooperation centers, as well as the noted initiatives in decision COP15/8,
 93 including the Global Knowledge Support Services for Biodiversity](#), by making full use of existing
 94 resources and cooperation with relevant organizations and processes, noting that any new and
 95 additional activities will [need to](#) be conducted subject to the availability of resources.

96 15. The strategy will consider the capacity, technical, technological and financial gaps that
 97 [undermine hamper](#) the capabilities of countries, in particular developing countries and countries with
 98 economies in transition, to produce and gain access to biodiversity-related data, information and
 99 knowledge. The strategy will also consider the need to engage indigenous peoples, local
 100 communities, women, youth and groups in vulnerable situations in research programmes for the
 101 conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity.

102 **VII. Monitoring**

103 14-16. The implementation of the strategy will be monitored using the information provided by
 104 Parties in their national reports and the indicators included in the monitoring framework for the
 105 Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework. Governmental and non-governmental actors
 106 may [adapt and](#) use the indicators to monitor, assess and report on the outcomes and impact of their
 107 knowledge management efforts at the national, regional and global levels. The information generated
 108 from the monitoring process will be used to inform the review and update of the strategy, as
 109 appropriate, in 2030.

In our view, the Strategy is clear and relevant as it reiterates the call for Parties to "map out" relevant data and systems, identify contributing people and institutions, and ultimately create a clearing house of knowledge in an inclusive way.
(2)	SANBI notes that the timeframe for the Strategy has not been indicated in the title or name of the Strategy. SANBI proposes that the timeframe for this Strategy be indicated upfront on the first page of the Strategy. This needs to align with the timeframes indicated in the Draft Knowledge Management Strategy 2025-2030 Work Plan.
(3)	The Strategy has no actions that promote the role of women and girls in light of the decision 15/11. This is despite the Gender Plan of Action containing some activities related to knowledge management that can be cross-referenced to explicitly promote the role of women and girls, namely: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ 1.2.3. Take specific measures to respect, preserve, and maintain the traditional knowledge, innovations and practices of all women and girls from indigenous peoples and local communities, as well as their corresponding rights relevant to the conservation and sustainable use of biological diversity. ▪ 1.5.1 Develop and deploy data, tools, and strategies to understand and address gender-based violence and biodiversity linkages, including with a focus on the protection of women environmental human rights defenders, to support biodiversity policy and programming development and implementation.

4	<p>SANBI proposes the insertion of text "<i>of the convention and its protocol</i>" in line 7 to ensure that the text is aligned with paragraph 8 of decision 15/4 of the Convention.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Knowledge management is one of the key strategic means of implementation of the Convention and <u>its protocols</u> that will underpin the achievement of the goals and targets of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, as recognized in Target 21 and Section K of the Framework.
7	<p>We note that the exclusion of the two protocols of the Convention in line 7 conflicts with decision 14/25 of the Convention wherein the Executive Secretary was requested to develop, in consultation with the informal advisory committees to the Clearing-House Mechanism, the Biosafety Clearing-House and the Access and Benefit-Sharing Clearing-House, a knowledge management component as a part of the preparatory process for the post-2020 global biodiversity framework. SANBI suggests that this Knowledge Management Strategy also supports the two protocols of the convention, in light of their respective empowering provisions. In line with this suggestion, therefore, SANBI proposes the following amendments in the paragraph:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The knowledge management Strategy supports the effective implementation of the Framework and complements its monitoring framework, the long-term strategic framework for capacity-building and development, the technical and scientific cooperation mechanism and the clearing-house mechanisms of the Convention and <u>its two protocols</u>.
16	<p>SANBI is of the view that the "Knowledge holders" referred to in this line is the knowledge held by the indigenous people and local communities. If that view is accepted, SANBI recommends the insertion of the term "traditional" to qualify the knowledge holders being referenced and to mean traditional knowledge holders and for consistency across the document. This proposal is also in line with paragraph 2 of Article 17. The newly amended paragraph is to read as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The strategy recognizes the four interdependent components of knowledge management, namely: (a) people, including various actors, such as <u>traditional</u> knowledge holders, indigenous peoples and local communities, managers, curators and users; (b) processes, that is, the relevant procedures, standards and policies; (c) technology, including the technological tools, systems and platforms; and (d) content, that is, biodiversity-related data, information and knowledge, including how it is managed, for example through cataloguing, tagging and indexing, digitization and organization.

Rationale: Despite the KMS are based on the FPIC, it worth mention it to reinforce the message, as it is a new and different document that refers, among others, to the particular activities to be carried out in the field.

*“[...] and their maturity levels in this area. **In line with the draft knowledge management strategy, all the activities that imply traditional knowledge, innovations and practices of indigenous peoples and local communities will be made available with their free, prior and informed consent***. Furthermore, a finalized work plan would correspond [...]”*

Footnote: **All references to “free, prior and informed consent” refer to the tripartite terminology of “prior and informed consent”, “free, prior and informed consent” or “approval and involvement”.*

The shift from a “component” of the GBF to a standalone strategy is welcomed and will give the document, once agreed, more weight.
The relation between the strategy and Target 21 could be elaborated and explained in more detail.
The strategy lacks any reference to new and innovative technology that have enormous potential in terms of their application to knowledge management – in particular artificial intelligence (AI) including large language models (LLMs). It is important to reference to these technologies, also given that they can vastly speed up or improve implementation of some of the actions listed under section VIII.
There is no explanation about how the different strategic objectives interact with each other, whether they are sequential or can be achieved on their own. There are a number of component actions that seem duplicative as a result.
For many of the actions listed in section VIII, the list of relevant actors seems incomplete – other actors, in addition to those listed, can play important roles in carrying these actions forward.

UNEP-WCMC welcomes the development of a knowledge management strategy for implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, and looks forwards to working with the CBD Secretariat and Parties, and with other organizations and stakeholders, to further its implementation.
In paragraph 2 reference is made to other strategies and activities to which the knowledge management strategy relates. Somewhere, but not necessarily in this document, there needs to be very clear explanation of how the following strategies and activities relate one to the other in supporting implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - long-term strategic framework for capacity-building and development - technical and scientific cooperation mechanism - knowledge management strategy - clearing-house mechanisms of the Convention

It may be useful to include reference somewhere to important contribution that effective knowledge management makes to not only implementation (both planning and management), but also to reporting, generation and use of indicators. Make more of the fact that enhanced knowledge management improves both efficiency and effectiveness.

It will be important to think carefully about how to include reference to financial needs within the table of strategic objectives and actions. Either it needs to be mentioned in appropriate places, or some explanation of why not needs to be given.

This draft indicative work plan for the implementation of the draft knowledge management strategy to support the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework for the period 2025 to 2030 has been prepared by the Secretariat in response to the request of the Ad Hoc Open-ended Intersessional Working Group on Article 8(j) and Related Provisions of the Convention on Biological Diversity in paragraph 2 of its recommendation 12/3 ([CBD/WG8J/REC/12/3](#)).

The strategic objectives and component actions are those contained in the draft strategy. The draft indicative work plan indicates the logical period over which each of the component actions would be implemented during the period 2025 to 2030 (section 1).

For component actions that would be implemented in the first biennium, 2025-2026, a draft work plan of suggested activities that would be conducted by the principal actors addressed in the draft strategy – by Parties at the national level, by the Secretariat, by IPLCs and by supportive organizations – is provided (section 2).

This proposed work plan presents suggested activities that can guide Parties in implementing the knowledge management strategy. However, it is important to emphasize that the plan is indicative rather than prescriptive. The activities may vary greatly among Parties depending on national circumstances, prior experience, and their maturity levels in this area. Furthermore, a finalized work plan would correspond to the knowledge management strategy once adopted by the Conference of the Parties.

While anticipating and planning key activities for the 2025-2026 biennium is sensible, the work plan would need regular revision and updates. This would allow it to incorporate lessons learned and experience gained during early implementation phases. Maintaining flexibility would ensure the plan remains relevant and practical for the diverse needs of Parties over the 2025-2030 timespan of the knowledge management strategy implementation.
