**Planning, monitoring, reporting and review: update on
national biodiversity strategies and action plans, national
targets and national reporting**

Summary of relevant information for the preparation of the global report and review of implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework**

Note by the Secretariat

I. Introduction

1. The present document contains the background and an update on the production of the global report of collective progress in the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, including the work of the Ad Hoc Scientific and Technical Advisory Group for the Preparation of the Global Report, and the work of the subsidiary bodies of the Convention.
2. The Subsidiary Body on Implementation is not expected to prepare a recommendation on the global report and review of implementation under agenda item 4 at the present meeting, as the task will be on the agenda for its subsequent meeting.

II. Background

3. By its decision [15/6](#), the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity adopted an enhanced multidimensional approach to planning, monitoring, reporting and review, with a view to enhancing the implementation of the Convention and of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and decided to conduct at its seventeenth and nineteenth meetings a global review of collective progress in the implementation of the Framework, including the means of implementation, based on national reports and, as appropriate, other sources of information.
4. By its decision [16/32](#), the Conference of the Parties decided that the global review will be primarily based on national reports and a global report on collective progress in the implementation of the Framework. In the same decision, the Conference of the Parties decided on the process and an indicative timeline leading to the global review and decided that the global review will culminate in a decision or decisions by the Conference of the Parties.

5. In the same decision, the Conference of the Parties established an ad hoc scientific and technical advisory group with a time-bound mandate until the seventeenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties and terms of reference contained in annex III of the same decision, to provide scientific, technical and technological recommendations, including on traditional knowledge, to support the preparation of the global report on the basis of the sources noted in paragraph 18 of the same decision.

6. In the same decision, the Conference of the Parties decided that the Advisory Group would report to and support the work of the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice in providing scientific, technical and technological advice to the Subsidiary Body on Implementation, which will guide the global review. The Advisory Group was established in April 2025¹ and has met formally six times at the time of reporting.² An update on the work of the Advisory Group and the production of the global report is presented below in section IV.

Guidance from the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice and the Subsidiary Body on Article 8(j) and Other Provisions of the Convention Related to Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities related to the global review process and the global report

7. Both the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice, at its twenty-seventh meeting, and the Subsidiary Body on Article 8(j) and Other Provisions of the Convention Related to Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities, at its first meeting, made recommendations related to the production of the global report.

8. In its recommendation [27/1](#), the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice approved the annotated outline of the global report on collective progress in the implementation of the Framework, based on a draft developed by the Advisory Group, and requested the Executive Secretary, under the guidance of the Advisory Group, to prepare the global report on the basis of decision 16/32. The Subsidiary Body recalled that the global review would be primarily based on the national reports and the global report, and also requested the Executive Secretary to collect information through the online reporting tool on commitments by actors other than national governments towards the implementation of the Framework, and to provide support for an informal technical dialogue to collect inputs to the global review, including the sharing of best practices, gaps and solutions.

9. In its recommendation [1/5](#), the Subsidiary Body on Article 8(j) and Other Provisions of the Convention Related to Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities, provided advice on traditional knowledge for the global report on collective progress in the implementation of the Framework. The Subsidiary Body recommended that the contributions of indigenous peoples and local communities, women and youth to the implementation of the Framework should be reflected in the global report. It also encouraged Parties to facilitate submissions on the indigenous knowledge systems and traditional knowledge of indigenous peoples and local communities, including women and youth among them, obtained with their free, prior and informed consent, as appropriate, so that such information may be used, inter alia, in the global report. It also requested the Executive Secretary to use the advice on traditional knowledge contained in its recommendation [1/5](#) when preparing the global report on collective progress, and to include inputs related to traditional knowledge, including best practices, challenges, gaps and solutions in the collection of inputs to be conducted during the informal technical dialogue.

10. More information on the informal technical dialogue is available below in section IV.

III. Role of the Subsidiary Body on Implementation

11. In its decision 15/6, the Conference of the Parties decided to mandate the Subsidiary Body on Implementation to develop the concrete procedures for the global review, including on the use of

indicators, and to prepare the review for consideration by the Conference of the Parties at its sixteenth meeting.

12. In its recommendation 4/2, the Subsidiary Body on Implementation made recommendations to the Conference of the Parties on the process and governance of the global review and on the content, structure and production of the global report.

13. In its decision 16/32, the Conference of the Parties decided that the global review would be a Party-led process guided by the Subsidiary Body on Implementation. In the same decision, the Conference of the Parties decided that the global review will also draw upon relevant recommendations of the subsidiary bodies to the Convention.

14. In its decision 16/32, the Conference of the Parties decided that the global report will draw upon, inter alia, as the primary source, national reports submitted in compliance with Article 26 of the Convention and in line with decision 15/6, and the global analysis of information in national biodiversity strategies and action plans and national targets provided pursuant to paragraph 15 of decision 15/6.

15. At the present meeting, the Subsidiary Body will have before it an analysis of the status of submission of national biodiversity strategies and action plans, national targets and national reporting.³ The Subsidiary Body will be invited to note the progress made in the submission of the global status of information submitted in national biodiversity strategies and action plans, national targets and national reports and to prepare a recommendation to promote submissions.

16. Under agenda item 3 (a) on resource mobilization at the present meeting, some linkages with the global review will be discussed. By its decision 16/34, the Conference of the Parties adopted a strategy for resource mobilization for the period 2025–2030. In paragraph 7 of the same decision, the Conference of the Parties recalled its earlier decision to keep the implementation of the strategy under review at each of its meetings, starting at the seventeenth meeting, through the global stocktake. Many of the requests in the same decision are related to the global review of progress in implementing the Framework, and resulting work will be based to a significant extent on the information provided in national reports. Given that the deadline for the submission of the seventh national report is 28 February 2026, the Secretariat will report on the work conducted in response to those requests at the seventh meeting of the Subsidiary Body.⁴

17. Under agenda item 6 on capacity-building and development and technical and scientific cooperation at the present meeting, some linkages with the global review will be discussed. In its decision 16/3, the Conference of the Parties requested the Informal Advisory Group on Technical and Scientific Cooperation to prepare terms of reference for the independent evaluation of the relevance and effectiveness of the long-term strategic framework and the technical and scientific cooperation mechanism, to be undertaken in 2029 in conjunction with the global review of collective progress in the implementation of the Framework, using, among others, the relevant indicators of the monitoring framework for the Framework, including those for Target 20, for consideration by the Subsidiary Body at a meeting held before the seventeenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. The Informal Advisory Group advised, inter alia, that the data and information collection process of the evaluations should be aligned with those of the global review of collective progress in the implementation of the Framework and the national reporting cycle, to minimize the reporting burden on Parties.⁵

18. More details on completed and upcoming work for the production of the global report are presented below in section IV.

IV. Update on the preparation of the global report and the work of the Advisory Group

19. The Advisory Group was established in April 2025.⁶ The group met formally online six times, and once informally on the margins of the twenty-seventh meeting of the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice.⁷ The Advisory Group provided guidance to the Secretariat related to:

(a) The use of the information sources described in paragraph 18 of decision [16/32](#) in producing the global report;

(b) The content and organization of the annotated outline for the global report, including on the incorporation of comments submitted through the peer review process.⁸ On the basis of this guidance the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice approved the annotated outline for the global report at its twenty-seventh meeting;

(c) The work plan for producing the global report, including particular aspects on which the Secretariat has requested detailed guidance from the Advisory Group (see section below on the “*Work plan for preparation of the global report*”).

Information sources for the global report

20. The Conference of the Parties in paragraph 18 of decision [16/32](#), identified that the primary source of information for the global report will be the seventh national reports. In its recommendation SBSTTA/27/1, the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice recalled that the timely submission of the seventh national reports by Parties is essential to the accuracy, completeness and policy relevance of the global report and to enable an inclusive assessment of collective progress across all regions. The deadline for the submission of national reports is 28 February 2026. As of 20 January 2026, no seventh national reports have been received.

21. National biodiversity strategies and action plans, and national targets submitted through the online reporting tool, are additional sources of information for the global report. Under agenda item 6 of the present meeting, the Subsidiary Body on Implementation will consider the analysis of national biodiversity strategies and action plans and national targets provided in documents CBD/SBI/6/4 and CBD/SBI/6/INF/5.

22. An update on the compilation and analysis of some of the other sources of information that should be drawn upon when preparing the global report, as decided by the Conference of the Parties in paragraph 18 of decision [16/32](#), is included below:

(a) A report on the regional and subregional dialogues convened to support the review and implementation of the Framework (per subparagraph 18 (i)) has been provided for the consideration of the present meeting;⁹

(b) By notification No. 2025-132, the Executive Secretary informed Parties, indigenous peoples and local communities, women and youth organizations and relevant organizations of the opportunity to submit information in the online reporting tool on commitments by actors other than national Governments towards the Framework (per subparagraph 18 (j)). As at 20 January 2026, four commitments were published in the online reporting tool;

(c) By notification No. 2025-099, the Executive Secretary invited relevant organizations, including Secretariats of biodiversity-related conventions and other relevant multilateral

environmental agreements, international organizations and processes, to submit information to support the production of the global report (per subparagraph 18 (k)). As at 20 January 2026, 28 substantive submissions had been received.¹⁰ Annex I contains more details on these submissions, including an early analysis of which targets of the Framework are supported by the activities reported by these organizations;

(d) By notification 2025-100, the Executive Secretary invited Parties, indigenous peoples and local communities to submit case studies and other information on relevant traditional knowledge, innovations, practices and technology of indigenous peoples and local communities for the global report (per subparagraph 18 (l)). As at 20 January 2026, 52 submissions had been received.¹¹ Annex II contains more details on these submissions, including a list of submissions linked to targets of the Framework.

23. Going forward, the Secretariat will produce and/or update documents summarizing and analysing inputs in line with subparagraphs 18 (a), (b), (c) of decision 16/32. This will include reports on the submission and content of national reports, the use of indicators in national reports (for the consideration of the Subsidiary body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice), and the global analysis of information in national biodiversity strategies and action plans.

Informal technical dialogue

24. In its decision 16/32, the Conference of the Parties decided that the global review will also draw upon, as relevant, the outcomes of an informal technical dialogue, and requested the Executive Secretary to facilitate, with the support of the Advisory Group, this dialogue among Parties, indigenous peoples and local communities, women and youth representatives, academia, the private and financial sectors, experts and other stakeholders on the scientific, technical and technological aspects of the global report and other relevant inputs to the global review, including the sharing of best practices, challenges, gaps and solutions. The Secretariat is currently exploring opportunities for organizing this informal technical dialogue, subject to the availability of resources.

Work plan for preparation of the global report

25. Based on the indicative timeline set out in annex IV of decision 16/32, the Secretariat has agreed the following work plan with the Advisory Group, to enable the preparation of a full draft of the global report to be sent for open peer review by 1 June 2026:

(a) Jan/Feb 2026: Drafting of sections of the report with little or no dependency on the national reports, in particular Part I.A (Introduction to the Framework and the global report); Part I.B (Concise scientific synthesis of the status of, and trends in, biodiversity); Part II.B.a (Global analysis of the aggregated national targets aligned with each global target, including a summary of how well the global target is covered by the national target); and Part II.E (Contributions of relevant MEAs, international organizations and processes towards the implementation of the Framework).

(b) Jan/Feb 2026: Work through sub-groups of the Advisory Group to provide detailed recommendations on specific sections of the global report on which the Secretariat has requested further guidance, namely:

- (i) Part I.B (Concise scientific synthesis of the status of, and trends in, biodiversity);
- (ii) Part II.C.a (Summary of the relationship between the collective progress towards the relevant targets of the Framework, and progress towards each goal, taking into account the considerations in section C of the Framework);
- (iii) Part II.C.d (A synthesis of non-prescriptive approaches for addressing the challenges, gaps and opportunities identified for each goal in the global report, with a view to making collective progress in implementation of the Framework);

- (iv) Part II.D (Review of the provision of means of implementation consistent with the Framework);
 - (c) From 16 to 19 March 2026: in-person meeting of the Advisory Group, making final recommendations on the scientific and technical content of the global report, including the guidance proposed by the subgroups mentioned above, as well as recommendations regarding Part III of the report (conclusions and key messages);
 - (d) From 20 March 2026 to 28 May 2026: drafting of remaining sections of the global report, based on analysis of the submitted seventh national reports, guidance provided by the Advisory Group, and additional sources outlined in paragraph 18 of decision 16/32, with a view to providing a full draft for open peer review on 1 June 2026;
 - (e) From 1 June 2026 to 28 June 2026: open peer review of full draft of the global report;
 - (f) From 29 June to 20 July: evaluation of peer review comments, preparation of a summary and general proposals for addressing them (Secretariat with guidance from the Advisory Group), in the form of information documents for the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice at its twenty eighth meeting, and the Subsidiary Body on Implementation at its seventh meeting.
 - (g) From 15 August to 31 August: in the light of peer reviewed comments and recommendations of the Subsidiary Bodies, preparation of the final draft of the global report, submission for layout and translation;
 - (h) On 7 September 2026: concise summary of the global report made available to Parties and observers;
 - (i) On 21 September 2026: full global report made available to Parties and observers;
 - (j) On 19 October 2026: publication of the global report.
26. To date the production of the global report has been generously supported through financial contributions from the European Union, the Kingdom of the Netherlands and Switzerland.

Annex I

Further details on submissions received in response to notification No. 2025-099

1. By notification No. 2025-099, issued on 30 July 2025, the Executive Secretary invited submissions from Secretariats of biodiversity-related conventions and other relevant multilateral environmental agreements (MEAs), international organizations and processes, to submit information relevant to the global report, in line with subparagraphs 17 (f) and 18 (k) of decision 16/32 of the Conference of the Parties.
2. To facilitate submission and collection of the information, the Secretariat, under the guidance of the Advisory Group, prepared a template including separate sections for (a) linkages between MEA, organization or process and the Framework; and (b) submission of case studies or examples of contributions of the MEAs to implementation of the Framework. In each case, those providing submissions were invited to identify which targets, goals or other sections of the Framework were addressed by the linkage, case study or example.
3. To date, a total of 28 substantive submissions using the template had been received, comprising nine submissions from MEA secretariats, five submissions from additional United Nations bodies, and 14 from additional institutions including stakeholder groups, intergovernmental organizations (IGOs), non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and research networks (Table 1). All submissions are available online at <https://www.cbd.int/notifications/2025-099>.
4. The Secretariat is in the process of analysing the detail of the submissions provided, principally to support the drafting of Part II.E of the global report, as described in the annotated outline approved by the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice at its twenty-seventh meeting, on the contribution of MEAs, international organizations and processes towards the implementation of the Framework. However, information and examples from the submissions may also be used to support drafting of other sections of the global report, for example the target-by-target summaries in Part II.B. Equally, Part II.E of the global report may use additional information beyond the submissions through notification 2025-099, consistent with subparagraph 18 (k) of decision 16/32.
5. As part of the analysis for preparation of the global report, the Secretariat has noted which targets of the Framework are addressed by each of the submissions made. The results for the nine MEAs whose submissions have been received are shown in Table 2. It should be noted that these relate only to targets explicitly mentioned in the submissions, either in the list of linkages or the case studies/examples provided by the respective MEA secretariats. Table 2 does not attempt to provide a comprehensive analysis of the contribution of MEAs towards implementation of the targets.

1. By notification No. 2025-100, issued on 30 July 2025, the Executive Secretary invited Parties, indigenous peoples and local communities, and stakeholders to submit case studies on relevant traditional knowledge, innovations, practices and technology of indigenous peoples and local communities, as well as other information on activities to engage and support indigenous peoples and local communities in implementing the Framework, to support the preparation of the global report on collective progress in the implementation of the Framework, in line with paragraph 18 of decision 16/32 of the Conference of the Parties.
2. To facilitate submission and collection of the information, the Secretariat, under the guidance of the Advisory Group, prepared a template including a separate sections to identify links to relevant elements of the Framework and its monitoring framework,
3. To date, a total of 52 submissions, 14 from Parties and 38 from Observers, have been received. The Secretariat is in the process of analysing the detail of the submissions provided. As part of the analysis for preparation of the global report, the Secretariat has noted which targets of the Framework are addressed by each of the submissions made (see table 1 below).
