DRAFT COMMON FORMAT FOR ACCESS AND BENEFIT SHARING CAPACITY-BUILDING AND DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES (ACTIVITIES, PROJECTS AND PROGRAMMES)

Note by the Executive Secretary

1. Article 22 of the Nagoya Protocol requires Parties to cooperate in capacity-building, capacity development and strengthening of human resources and institutional capacities to effectively implement the Protocol in developing country Parties and Parties with economies in transition. It also calls for information on capacity-building and development initiatives supporting the implementation of the Protocol to be provided to the Access and Benefit-sharing (ABS) Clearing-House with a view to promoting synergy and coordination on capacity-building and development for access and benefit-sharing (paragraph 6).

2. In its decision NP-1/8, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Nagoya Protocol (COP-MOP) invited Parties, other Governments, indigenous and local communities, relevant organizations, and the private sector, as appropriate, to provide to the ABS Clearing-House information regarding their capacity-building and development initiatives, including emerging best practices and lessons learned, and opportunities relevant to the implementation of the strategic framework (para. 5). In paragraph 10(b) of the same decision, COP-MOP also requested the Executive Secretary to ensure that information on capacity-building and development needs, opportunities and activities can be submitted to and accessed from all platforms under the Convention so that access and benefit-sharing capacity development activities are integrated into the global capacity development activities under the Convention.

3. In this regard, the Secretariat has developed a draft standardized form (common format) to enable Parties and relevant organizations to submit the information on ABS capacity-building and development initiatives to the Access and Benefit-sharing Clearing-House in a structured and harmonized manner. The common format will be used to collect and register basic descriptive information (metadata) in the Access and Benefit-sharing Clearing-House.

4. The draft common format includes predefined text (controlled vocabularies) to facilitate registration of information in a consistent manner and also allow for customized search and retrieval of the information in all six United Nations languages. As much as possible, the controlled vocabularies have been aligned with the controlled vocabularies of the clearing-house mechanism and the Biosafety Clearing-House.

5. The informal advisory committee on capacity-building is invited to provide comments and advice on the draft format during its discussions under agenda item 3.
