Comments for AHTEG (Cont)

- provide guidance using a collection of tools including public awareness through to the use of "bans", with the later, caution is advised as bans are often difficult to enforce and oftern drive trade underground.
- The use of lists of invasive species could be useful but should be associated with a specific area or region as invasiveness is associated with an ecosystem.
