#### PROGRAMME AND SUBPROGRAMME ACTIVITIES AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. This document describes the resource needs for the Secretariat to undertake the programme of work for the biennium 2009-2010. It provides further details on the proposed budget in document UNEP/CBD/COP/9/27. The information it contains represents the Secretariat's best estimates as regards work priorities in the coming biennium; it remains a "work in progress", and will continue to evolve in the light of the expected decisions to be adopted by the ninth conference of the Parties as well as future developments in the Convention process.
- 2. The document is organized into sections that correspond to the various programmes under the Secretariat. Additionally, the costs shared between the Convention and the Protocol are shown under the appropriate Divisions of the Convention, and also highlighted in order to be easily identifiable. The information on programme activities is presented using a standard template. The table below provides an explanation of the template. An explanation of the abbreviations used in this document is contained in the annex.
- 3. The activities carried out will respond to demands and priorities. Further information concerning the components of the table can be provided, upon request. Detailed descriptions will be made available upon request to interested Parties or Governments as well as during the planned meetings with donors aimed at encouraging multi-years programmatic support for the implementation phase of the Convention.

4. The overall management section of each programme includes the resources, other than staffing, allocated from the core budget for the programme as a whole. This includes items such as consultants, travel, expert meetings and equipment. This reflects the fact that the responsibility for these decisions resides with the director of the programme and the Management Committee of the Secretariat. The Secretariat has been organized along these lines in order to retain the necessary degree of flexibility to respond effectively to the needs of the process. The overall management section also includes a description of the key external links that the programme will have substantial contact with in order to carry out the described activities. As the mandate for all of these management activities is Article 24 of the Convention, in the interests of brevity the section on "mandate" has not been included in the overall management section of each programme.

  of Pollinators, more data on pollinator populations and their ecology, and prepare a
  report (consultancy: \$20K in 2009)
- Gather and disseminate information on the links between climate change and agricultural diversity (documentation: \$20K in 2010)
- Disseminate good practice examples and lessons learnt on soil biodiversity and food and nutrition (documentation of case-studies on food and nutrition: \$20K in 2009, documentation on soil biodiversity \$20K in 2010),
- Operationalize the Addis Ababa Principles and Guidelines in agriculture

(2) Improved understanding in the Secretariat and amongst Parties of the interlinkages between climate change and forest biodiversity, with a particular view on forest-based or forest-related mitigation and adaptation activities

*Mandate:* SBSTTA recommendation XIII/5; COP decision VIII/30; anticipated COP-9 decisions *Relevance to Strategic Plan goals and objectives:* 1.2, 1.3, 1.5, 4.4

#### Means/Activities:

Develop documents and briefing notes on climate change and forest biodiversity; liaise with key organizations in the field of forestry and climate change; monitor impacts of climate change and climate change response activities on forest biodiversity; provide advice to ongoing processes and emerging mechanisms, such as RED, on the integration of forest biodiversity aspects.

**Deliverables:** reference documents on forests and climate change; Expert workshop on impacts of bioenergy production on forest biodiversity; report on impacts of bioenergy production on forest biodiversity; formalized working relations with the World Bank Forest Carbon Partnership Facility; guidance document (Technical Series) on integration of forest biodiversity aspects into climate change mitigation activities (Expert workshop on bioenergy 60K in 2009; Consultant \$20K for research on guidance document in 2009; publication in Technical Series: \$10K in 2010)

**Deliverables:** Regional needs assessment and capacity building workshops; functioning and evolving online-toolkit for cross-sectoral integration of forest biodiversity; publication on best practice examples of achieving the 2010 target in forestry (two regional workshops in 2009: \$160K and three workshops in 2010: \$240K; consultant for toolkit: \$20K in 2009)

#### 5. Biological diversity of dry and sub-humid lands

(1) Strengthen collaboration on assessment of status, trends and threats to the biological diversity in dry and sub-humid lands

*Deliverables*: increase in sources of information for the assessment of status, trends and threats concerning the biodiversity of dry and sub-humid lands; updates to the baseline information already contained within the in-depth review of implementation.

(2) Work with relevant collaborators, in particular with the Secretariat of the UNCCD, to clarify the areas under question with a view to harmonizing the delineation of dry and sub-humid lands, using the UNEP/WCMC work on the definitions and delineations of dry and sub-humid lands

Mandate: SBSTTA recommendation XIII/6; decision VIII/2

Relevance to Strategic Plan goals and objectives: 1.2, 1.3, 1.5, 1.6, 2.1, 2.5

**Deliverables:** a concrete definition of dry and sub-humid lands; a GIS layer of dry and sub-humid lands according to the above-mentioned definition.

(3) Explore, with the FAO means to strengthen the collaboration in pastoralism and agricultural use of dry and sub-humid lands

*Means/Activities*: compilation of case-studies on pastoralism and agricultural use of dry and subhumid lands; identification of themes linking pastoral and agricultural livelihoods to the achievement of the 2010 biodiversity target in dry and sub-humid lands; portfolio review of the integration of biodiversity considerations within agricultural and pastoral investments among major donors and lending agencies (\$10,000 consultant fee for 2009)

**Deliverables:** A report on the actions that have already been undertaken and actions that needs to be carried out, taking into account the specific needs of dry and sub-humid lands and the people living in these lands, for further consideration by SBSTTA at one of its meetings prior to the tenth meeting of the Conference of the Parties
