## PROPOSALS ON THE RETIREMENT OF DECISIONS TAKEN BY THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES AT ITS FIFTH AND SIXTH MEETINGS

Proposals by the Executive Secretary pursuant to decision IX/29 on Operations of the Convention

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. In section III, paragraph 14 of decision IX/29, the Conference of the Parties, *inter alia*, requested the Executive Secretary to make proposals to its tenth meeting regarding the retirement of decisions and elements of decisions taken at its fifth and sixth meetings and to communicate such proposals to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations at least six months prior to its tenth meeting.
- 2. Accordingly, the Executive Secretary by a notification dated 9 April 2010, communicated the proposals to Parties, Governments and relevant international organizations. Comments were received from China, the European Union, Mexico and the Philippines. These comments were taken into consideration in this document's finalization.
- 3. This document should be read in conjunction with the annotated agenda (UNEP/CBD/COP/10/1/Add.1) and the compilation of draft decisions (UNEP/COP/10/1/Add.2). It is divided into two sections and contains two annexes.. Section II describes the process to review the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth and sixth meetings.

### II. REVIEW AND RETIREMENT OF DECISIONS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES

- 4. The full review of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties adopted at its fifth and sixth meetings is contained in annex I. Pursuant to paragraph 14(b) of decision IX/29, the review follows the same criteria and format adopted for earlier reviews undertaken, with the added criterion of "taking care to avoid retiring guiding principles and decisions that have not been implemented or reflected in subsequent decisions". On the basis of this review annex II identifies decisions and elements of decisions that could be retired by the Conference of the Parties because they either have been fully implemented and are of no continuing relevance or effect; have been superseded by subsequent decisions, or are only of historical value.
- 5. All comments received were very carefully considered by the Secretariat and reflected, as appropriate, in Annexes I and II. For ease of reference, this document maintains the Secretariat's original

proposals and accompanying rationale, while providing in Annex I the annotated comments made by the four Parties that responded to the notification.

- 6. Comments included proposals not to retire certain decisions and elements of decisions. In keeping with past practice of not retiring a decision or element of a decision where a Party objects, these were accordingly reflected in the revised proposals for retirement in Annex II. An indication of which Party made a proposal to retain has been added for information in the revised list of proposals in Annex II.
- 7. In a new development since the retirement process was initiated, one Party in its comments also proposed retiring additional elements of decisions from the fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. A separate list of the proposals has been included in Annex II indicating the Party that made the proposals.
- 8. The revised list of proposals, including the proposals to retire additional elements of decisions, has been reflected in the draft decision found in document UNEP/CBD/COP/10/1/Add.2.
- It should be noted that in decision IX/31 C, paragraph 1, the Conference of the Parties requested the Executive Secretary to identify obsolete, repetitive and overlapping guidance, and prepare an updated compilation of the existing guidance to the financial mechanism, which should incorporate all decisions related to the financial mechanism. Proposals were provided to the third meeting of the Ad Hoc Working Group on Review of Implementation (WGRI) UNEP/CBD/WG-RI/3/9. In its recommendation 3/10, WGRI suggested that the Executive Secretary (a) further develop the document, (b) undertake an electronic consultation with Parties on a proposed consolidated list of guidance to the financial mechanism, and (c) prepare a draft decision on a consolidated list of guidance to the financial mechanism for consideration by COP10. The outcomes of the COP's consideration of this issue may result in additional retirements which the Secretariat would then subsequently reflect in relation to the respective COP5 and COP6 decisions on the Convention's website.

A. Fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties

### DECISION V/1: WORK PLAN OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE FOR THE CARTAGENA PROTOCOL ON BIOSAFETY

Overview of the decision

The decision approves a work plan for the Intergovernmental Committee for the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (ICCP), an interim arrangement established by decision EM-I/3 of the extraordinary meeting of the Conference of the Parties, to undertake the preparations necessary for the first meeting of the Parties to the Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

Since ICCP ceased to exist upon the convening of the first meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Protocol (COP-MOP) from 23-27 February 2004, this decision will have only historical significance. The entire decision could be retired.

# DECISION V/2: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK ON THE BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY OF INLAND WATER ECOSYSTEMS (IMPLEMENTATION OF DECISION IV/4)

Overview of the decision

The decision reviews the implementation of the programme of work on biodiversity of inland water ecosystems adopted by decision IV/4; endorses the joint work plan between the CBD and the Ramsar Convention for the period 2000-2001; and mandates SBSTTA to provide advice on the further refinement of the programme of work.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

A revised programme of work was adopted at the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VII/4). A third joint work plan (2002-2006) with the Ramsar Convention was endorsed at the

sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision VI/20). The River Basin Initiative is ongoing. Paragraphs 1 and 3-8 could be retired.

Overview of the decision

The decision reviews the implementation of the programme of work adopted at the fifth meeting of the Conference of the Parties (decision IV/5)

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision has largely been superseded by decision VII/5 which endorsed an elaborated programme of work on marine and coastal biodiversity. The Conference of the Parties could retire this decision in its entirety.

## DECISION V/4: PROGRESS REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF WORK FOR FOREST BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Overview of the decision

The decision established the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group on Forest Biological Diversity to assist SBSTTA in its work on forest biological diversity and, in particular, to provide advice on scientific programmes and international cooperation in research and development related to the conservation and sustainable use of forest biological diversity and to review information on status and trends. The decision also provided a framework for cooperation and the development of synergies with the UNFCCC and its Kyoto Protocol on forest-related issues.

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The decision has been largely superseded by decision VI/22 that adopted an expanded programme of work on forest biological diversity on the basis of the work of the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group and SBSTTA. The decision, except paragraph 16, could be retired. In its comments, Mexico proposed retiring annex I referenced in paragraph 4 (terms of reference for the AHTEG on forest biological diversity), as well as paragraph 16.

Overview of the decision

The decision endorsed a programme of work on agricultural biodiversity; invited several international organizations to cooperate in its implementation; established an International Initiative for the Conservation and Sustainable Use of Pollinators within the programme of work to promote coordinated international action; and initiated work on genetic use restriction technologies.

The programme of work on agricultural biodiversity is under implementation. Work continues on genetic use restriction technologies and their impact. Paragraphs 1-2, 8, 11-12, 19-21, 28 and 29 could be retired. In its comments China proposed not to retire paragraphs 11 and 12. In its comments, the EU proposed not to retire paragraph 19. In its comments, Mexico proposed retiring paragraphs 18, 23-24 and 27.

Paragraphs 3–6 could be retired. In its comments, Philippines proposed not to retire paragraphs 3 and 6.

#### DECISION V/11: ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL RESOURCES

Overview of the decision

This decision focuses on the collection and dissemination of financial data through CHM and other means, engagement of funding institutions and development agencies as well as other donors, and national funding measures. This emphasis is specifically pronounced for capacity building for the implementation of the Cartagena Protocol.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The requests to the Executive Secretary were implemented and reported to the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties. Other stakeholders have probably implemented relevant requests as well. But since this is the first comprehensive decision on financial resources, many elements of the decisions will remain operational.

The emphasis for additional and adequate financial resources specific to the Biosafety Protocol would obviously remain standing. The Cartagena Protocol has now entered into force. An Action Plan for Building Capacities for the Effective Implementation of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety has been adopted by the first meeting of COP-MOP. As a result, similar calls for additional financial resources have been and will be made by COP-MOP. The decision may have no immediate significance any more but the objective of emphasizing the need for additional financial resources through the financial mechanisms is ongoing. Paragraphs 2 -3, 7 -8, 11, 13 -14 and 17 could be retired. **In its comments, the Philippines proposed not to retire paragraphs 11-14.**

#### DECISION V/20: OPERATIONS OF THE CONVENTION

Overview of the decision

The decision amends a number of rules of procedure of the Conference of the Parties; provides a mandate for the development of the Strategic Plan of the Convention; reviews the operational procedures of SBSTTA; and mandates holding an open-ended inter-sessional meeting on the strategic plan, national reports and implementation of the Convention.

Overall assessment and possible action by Conference of the Parties

In Section I, paragraphs 4 and 6 could be retired. Paragraph 8 could be retired depending on the outcomes of the retirement and consolidation process for guidance to the financial mechanism initiated by COP-9 in decision IX/31, C, paragraph 1 and further elaborated in UNEP/CBD/WG-RI/3/9. The elements of the decision relating to the Strategic Plan (Section II) have been fully implemented and could be retired. In Section III, with exception of paragraphs 34 and 36, all elements of the decision could be retired. In Section IV, with the exception of paragraph 41, the elements relating to the review of the decisions of the Conference of the Parties and the review of implementation of the Convention have either been implemented or superseded by subsequent decisions taken by COP-6 and 7 and could be retired. In its comments, the EU proposed not to retire paragraphs 8, 18-22, 24-26 and 29(a), (c) and (d). In its comments, the Philippines proposed not to retire paragraphs 8 and 35.

For the development of the list of indicators, there is a need for harmonization and collaboration with regional and international initiatives, including the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, the Commission on Sustainable Development, the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands, the Pan-European processes (the Pan-European Biological and Landscape Strategy and the Ministerial Conference on the Protection of Forests in Europe), the Montreal process on criteria and indicators for the conservation and sustainable management of temperate and boreal forests, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and the United Nations Forum on Forests;

#### **DECISION VI/11: LIABILITY AND REDRESS**

Overview of the decision

The decision established a process for the review of Article 14, paragraph 2, of the Convention. It requested the Executive Secretary to convene a group of legal and technical experts and specified its mandate.

Overall assessment and possible action by the Conference of the Parties

The group of legal and technical experts did not meet during the inter-sessional period between COP-6 & 7 due to funding constraints. COP 7 renewed the request contained in decision VI/11. The Group held its meeting in Montreal from 12-14 October 2005 and made recommendations for the consideration of COP 8 (see document UNEP/CBD/COP/8/27/Add. 3). Paragraphs 1 and 3 could be retired. In its comments, the EU proposed not to retire paragraph 3. In its comments, the Philippines proposed not to retire paragraph 3.

## DECISION VI/23\*: ALIEN SPECIES THAT THREATEN ECOSYSTEMS, HABITATS OR SPECIES

Overview of the decision

The decision adopts the Guiding Principles for the Prevention, Introduction and Mitigation of Impacts of Alien Species that threaten Ecosystems, Habitats or Species. It also outlines a number of activities to be undertaken by the Executive Secretary as well as by relevant international and regional organizations.

Overall Assessment & Action by the Conference of the Parties

The Guiding Principles are of continuing effect since they provide guidance to Parties on implementation. The activities outlined are under implementation. No action by the Conference of the Parties is therefore recommended. The reference to GEF could be retired in paragraphs 19, 22 and 33 depending on the outcomes of the retirement and consolidation process for guidance to the financial mechanism initiated by COP-9 in decision IX/31, C, paragraph 1 and further elaborated in UNEP/CBD/WG-RI/3/9. Paragraphs 1-3, 7, 9 and 32 could be retired. In its comments, the EU proposed not to retire paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 7.
