Pangolins are the most commonly traded mammals in this region. It is estimated that over 200 tons of pangolins and body parts have been illegally traded across Asia.

Many shipments of pangolins have been seized by the authorities but they represent only a small fraction of the total illegal trade.

Customs officers inspecting pangolins seized in Bangkok airport.

**THE RECENT SEIZURES INCLUDE:**

- 68,000 kg of pangolin meat, 900 kg of scales, and 2,849 pangolins seized in Nov 07. 5 people were charged in the Fujian Province of China.
- 275 live pangolins seized near the Laos border in Jan 08
- 23 tons of slaughtered pangolins seized in Vietnam in Mar 08
- 98 live pangolins seized in Penang, Malaysia in April 08

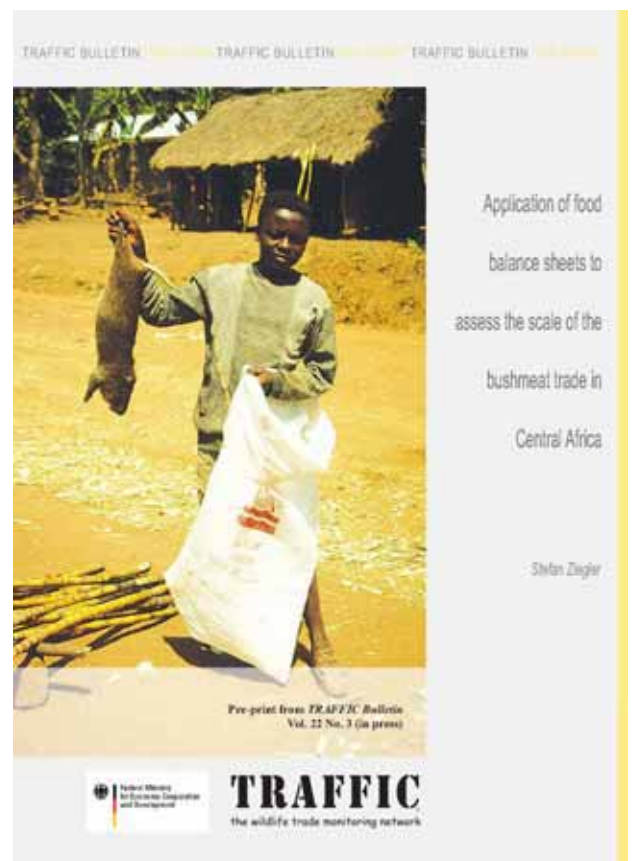
