Rustenburg, South Africa, 14-18 January 2008

ANNOTATIONS TO THE PROVISIONAL AGENDA

INTRODUCTION

1. In paragraph 6 of Decision VIII/8, the Conference of the Parties recommended that regional and/or sub-regional workshops be convened to discuss national experiences in implementing national biodiversity strategies and action plans (NBSAPs), and the integration of biodiversity concerns into relevant sectors, including consideration of obstacles and ways and means for overcoming the obstacles. In its Recommendation 2/1, the second meeting of the Working Group on Review of Implementation of the Convention (Paris, July 9-13 2007) reemphasized the importance of organizing such regional workshops.

2. In response, the Executive Secretary is organizing a series of regional/sub-regional workshops on capacity building for national biodiversity strategies and action plans during 2008. The regional workshop for Southern and Eastern Africa is the second of the series. With financial support from Canada, Germany and the United Kingdom, the Secretariat is organizing this workshop from 4 to 8 February 2008 at the Kedar Country Hotel, Rustenburg, North West Province, Republic of South Africa.

3. The purpose of the workshop is to strengthen national capacities for the development, implementation, reviewing and updating of national biodiversity strategies and action plans and the integration of biodiversity considerations into relevant national policies, strategies and planning processes. These include cross-sectoral national strategies such as those for development, poverty reduction, the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals, adaptation to climate change and combating desertification. Sectoral strategies, such as those for agriculture, forestry, fisheries and tourism, and national and local planning processes are also included. The workshop will promote the exchange of experiences and training on the use of relevant tools and mechanisms, and provide an opportunity for countries to identify ways and means for overcoming challenges in the development and implementation of NBSAPs and mainstreaming. The outcomes of the workshop will provide inputs to the ongoing review of implementation of goals 2 and 3 of the Strategic Plan to be considered by the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties in May 2008.

In order to minimize the environmental impacts of the Secretariat's processes, and to contribute to the Secretary-General's initiative for a C-Neutral UN, this document is printed in limited numbers. Delegates are kindly requested to bring their copies to meetings and not to request additional copies.

4. Participants in the workshop comprise officials from each of the countries in the region responsible for the development and/or implementation of NBSAPs, as nominated by the CBD national focal points as well as resource persons selected for their expertise and experience in supporting the development and implementation of NBSAPs or for integrating biodiversity into national development strategies and planning processes. As indicated in the notification for this workshop, the nominated participants “should be in a position to prepare and present a report on progress made in the development, implementation, reviewing and updating of national biodiversity strategies and action plans, as well as and the integration of biodiversity concerns into relevant sectors (for example, by using the voluntary guidelines annexed to Decision VIII/8). Moreover, following the workshop, the representative should be in a position to translate the capacity gained into concrete actions in support of national implementation.” Accordingly, nominated participants are requested to undertake some preparatory activities as set out in Annex III.

5. The Secretariat is issuing an information note for participants containing details of logistical arrangements including information on travel, visa requirements, accommodation and other matters for the workshop. The information note is available at www.cbd.int/doc/meeting.aspx?mtg=NBSAPCBW-SEAFR-01 . The language of the workshop will be English.

6. Registration of participants will commence on site at 8.30 a.m. on Monday, 14 January 2008.

ITEM 1. OPENING OF THE MEETING AND ORGANIZATIONAL MATTERS

7. A representative of the host Government will open the meeting at 9.00 a.m. on Monday, 4 February 2008. A representative of the Executive Secretary of the Convention on Biological Diversity will also welcome the participants and make an opening statement.

ITEM 2. OVERVIEW OF THE OBJECTIVES AND PROGRAMME FOR THE WORKSHOP

8. The Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity will give an overview of the objectives, the programme and the expected outcomes of the workshop.

9. The provisional agenda of the workshop prepared by the Executive Secretary is available in document UNEP/CBD/NBSAP/CBW-SE-AFR/1/1. The proposed organization is provided in Annex I below. The following provides an overview of the proposed Workshop programme:

Day 1: Status of development and implementation of national biodiversity strategies and action plans in the region; and

Updating and improvement of national biodiversity strategies and action plans.

Day 2: Integrating biodiversity considerations into sectoral and cross-sectoral plans, programmes and policies including poverty reduction strategies, strategies for achieving MDGs and national and local planning processes;

Day 3: Field visit demonstrating the mainstreaming of biodiversity; and

Tools and guidance available for integrating biodiversity considerations into sectoral and cross-sectoral plans, programmes and policies;

Day 4: Communication and Reporting; and

Ways forward and next steps in implementing and updating and on mainstreaming of biodiversity.

Day 5: Departures;

The emphasis of the workshop will be on exchange and active learning. With this in mind, the workshop format features a mix of presentations with question and answer sessions, discussions in small working groups, and interactive sessions to introduce relevant tools and training modules.

10. A list of documents for the workshop is attached as Annex II.

ITEM 3. STATUS OF DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF NATIONAL BIODIVERSITY STRATEGIES AND ACTION PLANS

11. In decision VIII/8 (paragraph 10 (a) (ii)), the Conference of the Parties decided to conduct an in-depth review of the implementation of goals 2 and 3 of the Strategic Plan to be focused on the status of national biodiversity strategies and action plans, their implementation and updating, and the extent to which biodiversity concerns are effectively integrated into relevant sectors and have been effectively mainstreamed in accordance with Article 6(b) of the Convention. As mentioned above, this series of Workshops is envisaged to contribute to that process.

12. Under this agenda item, participants will consider:

- (a) A global overview of the status of NBSAPs, drawing upon the preparation for and the conclusions of the second meeting of the Working Group on Review of Implementation of the Convention, 13-17 July, 2007, Paris France.¹
- (b) A regional overview of the status of NBSAPs, drawing upon national reports, NBSAPs, and the experience of UNEP, UNDP and other organizations.
- (c) Presentations on the status of NBSAPs by some participating countries.

13. Participants will then discuss national experiences and lessons learned in the development and implementation of national biodiversity strategies and action plans, focusing on:

- (a) Status of NBSAPs or similar strategies and programmes;
- (b) Major Features of NBSAPs;
- (c) Priority actions identified for implementing NBSAPs;
- (d) Mechanisms identified for implementing NBSAPs;
- (e) Obstacles encountered in the implementation of NBSAPs; and,
- (f) Reviews undertaken of the implementation of NBSAPs and assessment of the effectiveness of the strategy;

14. Participants from all countries of the region will have the opportunity to present their NBSAPs during the course of the week. As preparation for the workshop, participants are requested to undertake a self-review of their NBSAPs using the guidelines annexed to decision VIII/8 (see also Annex III).

15. This agenda item will be complemented by a poster session during the workshop where participating countries could display their posters on development and implementation of national or local biodiversity strategies and action plans. To ensure consistency in developing posters, countries are requested to follow the guidelines which are available at <http://www.cbd.int/meetings/wgri-02/poster-guidelines.shtml>.

ITEM 4. UPDATING AND IMPROVEMENT OF NATIONAL BIODIVERSITY STRATEGIES AND ACTION PLANS

16. Under this item, the Secretariat will introduce the guidance provided by the Conference of the Parties and the recommendation from the second meeting of the Working Group on Review of Implementation concerning the development, implementation and updating of national biodiversity strategies and action plans (WGRI Recommendation 2/1).

17. Participants, working in small groups will analyse their countries' NBSAPs in the light of recent guidance developed under the Convention with a view to identifying ways of improving the NBSAP and its implementation. Particular focus will be on identifying national targets within the framework developed by the Conference of the Parties.

ITEM 5. INTEGRATING BIODIVERSITY INTO SECTORAL AND CROSS-SECTORAL PLANS, PROGRAMMES AND POLICIES

18. The importance of integrating biodiversity considerations into relevant sectoral and cross-sectoral strategies, plans and programmes is underlined in Article 6(b) of the Convention and has been stressed in many decisions of the Conference of the Parties. This includes COP-8 which, in considering the implications of the findings of the Millennium Ecosystem Assessment, urged Parties and other Governments to promote dialogue among different sectors, to mainstream biodiversity at the regional and national levels including, when appropriate, through the processes of the Convention, to address linkages between the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity and, among others, international trade, finance, agriculture, forestry, tourism, mining, energy and fisheries. The Working Group on Review of Implementation of the Convention, when considering guidance for NBSAPs, has made further recommendations in this regard.

19. Under this item, workshop participants will hear a number of presentations on mainstreaming biodiversity into relevant sectoral strategies, plans and programmes. These include national experiences and lessons learned in mainstreaming into poverty reduction strategies. Some participants from local and provincial governments and non-governmental organizations will introduce how relevant stakeholders are involved in mainstreaming biodiversity. UNDP and UNEP will also introduce their work in the region on helping countries mainstream biodiversity and possible support to continued work in this regard.

20. Relevant tools and case studies on how to mainstream biodiversity into relevant sectoral and cross-sectoral strategies, plans and programmes will be introduced, including strategic environmental assessment and the use of the conceptual framework of the Millennium Ecosystem Assessment. Working in small groups participants will have the opportunity to examine the various tools and approaches.

21. A field trip will be arranged to a project to demonstrate the mainstreaming of biodiversity into cross-sectoral strategies and the engagement of local communities.

ITEM 6. COMMUNICATION AND REPORTING

22. Clearly communicating the importance of national biodiversity strategies and action plans and enhancing public education and awareness of NBSAPs are very important for mobilizing public support for and public participation in their development, implementation and updating as well as mainstreaming biodiversity into relevant sectors. And of course, reviewing and reporting on the implementation of national biodiversity strategies and action plans are also important for assessing the effectiveness of the strategies and, on that basis, updating NBSAPs and further enhancing their implementation.

23. Under this item, countries are invited to share their plans for and approaches to communicating NBSAPs and enhancing public awareness of and participation in the development, implementation and updating of NBSAPs.

24. The Secretariat will introduce the guidelines for the fourth national report, which focus on implementation of national biodiversity strategies and action plans and progress towards the 2010 Biodiversity Target. The Secretariat will also introduce a reference manual developed to assist with the preparation of the fourth national report. Support from GEF for the fourth national reports will be outlined.

**ITEM 7. THE WAY FORWARD: NEXT STEPS IN IMPLEMENTING AND UPDATING
NBSAPS AND ON MAINSTREAMING OF BIODIVERSITY**

25. Building upon work in earlier sessions, workshop participants will examine ways forward and key next steps for implementing and updating NBSAPs and mainstreaming biodiversity in national strategies and planning processes. Workshop participants will be divided into several groups to discuss ways forward. A panel will be selected to lead discussions in plenary.

ITEM 8. CONSIDERATION OF THE CONCLUSIONS OF THE WORKSHOP

26. The Workshop will consider the conclusions of the workshop and possible inputs that could be provided to the in-depth review of goals 2 and 3 of the Strategic Plan by the Conference of the Parties at its ninth meeting (May 19-31, 2008, Bonn, Germany).

ITEM 9. CLOSURE OF THE WORKSHOP

27. The Workshop is expected to close in the afternoon or early evening of Thursday 7 February 2008.

*Annex III***PREPARATION FOR THE CAPACITY BUILDING WORKSHOPS**

As was indicated in the official notification for the workshop available at <http://www.cbd.int/nbsap/workshops.shtml>, participants nominated by Parties are requested to prepare for the workshop in a number of ways.

Firstly, participants are requested prepare some information on their country's NBSAP that could be shared with other participants within the context of workshop discussion sessions. The voluntary guidelines for review of NBSAPs annexed to Decision VIII/8 are being used as a tool in preparing for the workshop. (<http://www.cbd.int/convention/decisions.shtml?m=COP-08&id=11020&lg=0>.) Participants are requested to bring with them a copy of their country's NBSAP, both in printed and electronic versions. All participants are requested to prepare a poster presentation following the guidelines referred to below. Participants making a brief presentation on their NBSAP as *powerpoint* presentations should ideally limit their presentations to 5 - 10 slides focussing on (i) description of the NBSAP; (ii) preparatory process/ stakeholder involvement; (iii) examples of achievements in implementation; (iv) how the NBSAP is related to mainstream national strategies and planning processes; (v) national targets included in the NBSAP; and (v) evaluation and updating of the NBSAP.

Secondly, participants are requested to provide the Secretariat (as electronic files, web addresses, or by mail to the address below) any useful documents prepared by their country in relation to the NBSAP and its implementation. This might include information on tools and guidelines for NBSAP implementation, reviews or progress reports generated at the national level on the NBSAP for purposes of monitoring and evaluation, communication strategies, and case studies illustrating how biodiversity has been integrated into economic sectors and national strategies for poverty eradication. We will be drawing on these national examples and experiences throughout the workshop, and will incorporate information on approaches and best practices into the Clearing-House Mechanism

Thirdly, participants are encouraged to develop a poster on their NBSAP and the linkage to the 2010 Biodiversity Target. An online poster generation tool has been developed by *Deutsche Gesellschaft für Technische Zusammenarbeit* (GTZ) that enables users to easily create posters from their own computer. These posters will offer a further opportunity to share national experiences in implementing the Convention through NBSAPs at the workshop. The posters will be incorporated into a poster session on this same subject that is being planned for the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to be held in May 2008 in Bonn, Germany. As part of their posters, *powerpoint* presentations, or separately, all participants are invited to prepare case studies of activities that contribute to the achievement of the 2010 Biodiversity Target. Such cases should demonstrate significant reductions in the loss of biodiversity (or a specific component) within a defined scale. The case will be most useful if it contains lessons that are more widely applicable. The following information should be provided: (i) Full description of the reduction in biodiversity loss; (ii) Measures taken to achieve the change; (iii) Relevant external factors that may have influenced the rate of biodiversity loss or likely to do so in the future; (iv) Measures in place or planned to ensure that the reduction is sustained; and (v) Conclusions and lessons learned.
