Two important aspects of element 2

- ■National reviews to <u>diversify PA governance types</u> e.g. indigenous/community conserved areas (ICCAs), private protected areas (PPAs), co-managed protected areas (CMPAs)
- Improve the quality of governance; Participation, rights and responsibilities, equitable costs and benefits, respect and maintenance of traditional knowledge (article 8j), accountability, prior informed consent,

Implementation

Official reviews, and assessments by Indigenous peoples and civil society networks indicate...

■Element 2 amongst the most neglected in implementation

Integration of rights, sharing of decisionmaking, and equity generally poor (with exception of a few countries)

Why is there inadequate progress?

Globally: inadequate emphasis in implementation in initial phase

"We'll deal with governance issues later"

First several regional workshops did not focus on governance at all (next few have)

Why is there inadequate progress? (contd)

Nationally: lack of conviction about value of new paradigm:

"Will a change in governance be good for conservation?"

"Will Communities be able to govern important conservation sites?"

"Can conservation be achieved by granting all Rights?"

Why is there inadequate progress? (contd)

Nationally/locally: lack of knowledge, capacity, tools, supportive environment

"We don't have any
Private/community/indigenous
conserved areas"

"We don't have the policies in place"

Plugging the gap...

2nd phase of regional workshops included one session on governance

Jeju conference in 2009 recommended several actions including toolkit/handbook

CoP 10 draft decision requests development of toolkit for implementation of element 2 (Art. 7 a&b)

Training Course and Toolkit on Governance of Protected Areas



Develop a toolkit containing:

- 1. a broad outline for a training course and activities,
- 2.reading materials on governance quality and types;
- 3.list of key resources that can be accessed (websites, experts, organizations)

Format: booklet with interactive training materials, with an attached CD/DVD containing additional resources and elearning tool

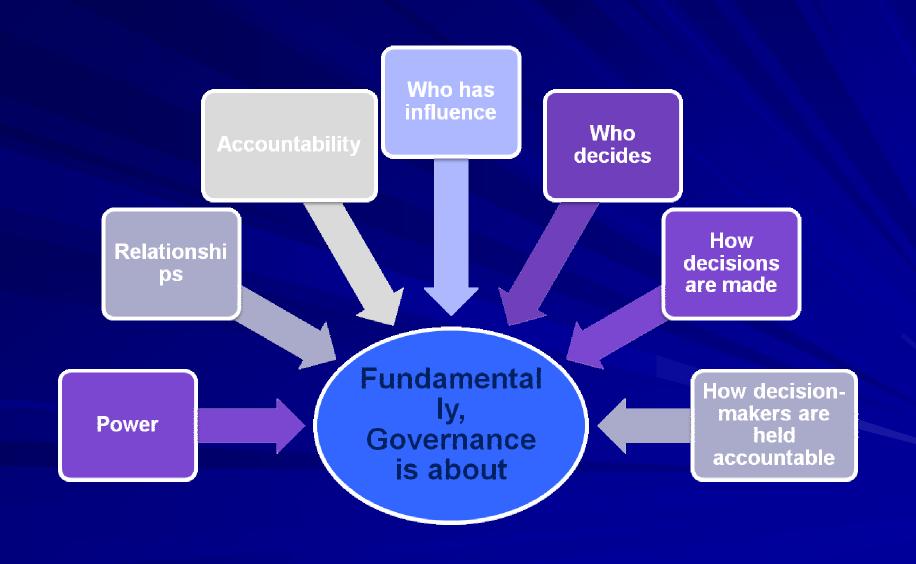

Is it possible that the official bodies and government staff may not have anything to do with actual Governance?

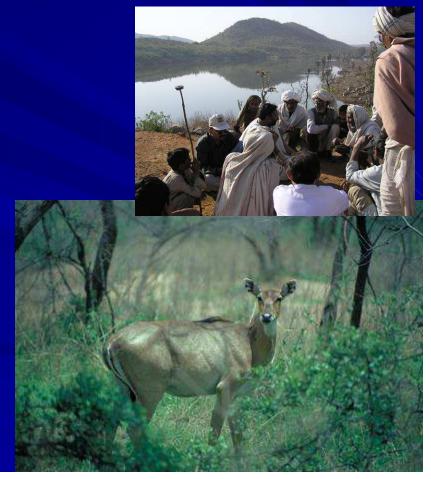
Is it any different from management?

Defined by who holds PA management authority and responsibility?

4 main "governance types" based on this, with PAs managed by:

- A. government (at various levels)
- B. indigenous peoples and local communities
- C. private owners of land and natural resources (individuals, corporate actors...)
- D. various parties (together)

The answer to this question lets us know about the protected area GOVERNANCE TYPE

2. How is that authority exercised? How fairly, effectively, transparently, accountably?

The answer to this question lets us know about the protected area GOVERNANCE QUALITY

The indicators of quality will help us assess this......

Principles of "good governance"

- Quality principles of "good governance" related to the work of UN agencies and highlighted at the 5th World Parks Congress and beyond are:
 - **OLegitimacy**
 - Subsidiarity
 - **O**Transparency
 - O Accountability
 - Participation
 - **OEquity/ Fairness**
 - OVision/ Direction
 - **O**Performance
 - ORule of law
