## **MESSAGE ON THE INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF BIODIVERSITY FOR THE WEBSITE OF THE CONVENTION ON BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY**

Welcome to the official website of the International Year of Biodiversity.

The Heads of State and Government attending the World Summit on Sustainable Development, held in Johannesburg in August/September 2002, agreed to substantially reduce the rate of loss of biodiversity by 2010. This commitment was confirmed by the 154 Heads of State and Government at the 2005 World Review Summit.

However, biodiversity continues to be lost at unprecedented rate, thus threatening the capacity of the planet to continue providing its good and services. The current rate of extinction is estimated to be up to 1,000 times higher than the natural rate of extinction. We may be entering a new era of the sixth global mass extinction of species and the first to be generated by human beings. If current loss rates continue, it is expected that an area of 1.3 billion hectares worldwide – about 1.5 times the United States – will completely lose its original biodiversity levels by 2050. This unprecedented loss of biodiversity is being compounded by climate change. More than 30 per cent of all known species may disappear before the end of this century owing to climate change.

The impact and consequences of this unprecedented loss of the ability of our planet to continue providing its goods and services that we human beings take for granted is unknown to the larger audience as well as to policy makers.

It is for this reason that the United Nations General Assembly declared 2010 as the International Year of Biodiversity with a view of engaging the people all over the world in the fight to protect life on Earth. The goals of this unique event in the life of the Convention on Biological Diversity is to raise awareness about the importance of biodiversity, to communicate the human costs of its ongoing loss, and to get the people, and in particular youth and children, involved in efforts to conserve and sustainably use our natural heritage and to protect our lives and the lives of our children. As the slogan of the International Year reminds us, “Biodiversity is life. Biodiversity is OUR life.”

The official launch of the International Year of Biodiversity will take place in Berlin in early January under the chairmanship of Dr. Angela Merkel, the Chancellor of Germany, the current President of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention. Brazil, the President of the Conference of the Parties at its eighth meeting, will mark this event in Curitiba, Brazil. It will be followed by a high-level event in Paris at UNESCO, during which a travelling global exhibition on biodiversity will be launched. The Year will be marked during the sixty-fifth session of
