a. Context

Decision Base for OEWG

Part 1

- The process will be Party lead guided by the Principles adopted in Annex 1 to the Decision – *participatory, inclusive, gender responsive, transformative, comprehensive, catalytic, visible, knowledge-based, transparent, efficient, result-oriented, iterative and flexible*
- Parties, other Governments, UN Organizations, IPLCs, NGOs, Academia, Youth, women groups, faith-based organizations ... expected to participate in the process. The process is to be gender-responsive and gender-balanced
- COP adopted the process for the preparation of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework;
- Secretariat to facilitate implementation, implementation will need flexibility to adapt to changing circumstances and respond to emerging opportunities
- An Open-ended Working Group (OEWG) was established to support the preparation and the Co-chairs.
- The post-2020 global biodiversity framework is expected to have inspirational and motivating 2030 mission as a stepping stone towards the 2050 Vision “Living in harmony with nature”
- Parties and organizations in a position to do so to provide timely financial contributions
- SBI and SBSTTA to contribute to the development of the Post2020 global biodiversity framework

a. Context

Defining Success

Part 1

- A process that
 - will facilitate and enable decision making at CoP15
 - CoP focus on the right issues
 - CoP and parties have the element enabling them to reach consensus
 - is understood and supported by parties, civil society, NGOs
 - Adhere to the overarching principles guiding the preparatory process for the post-2020 global biodiversity framework
 - independent/impartial
 - respect CBD decisions and promote its values
 - Create good will at CoP15
 - Address expectations from Parties
 - Result in Post2020 global biodiversity framework that will be owned by Parties
 - This to facilitate expedient implementation

a. Issues

Timing & Pace of work

Part 1

- Timing
 - Asia pacific group had very little time to internalize The draft discussion paper it before the start of the workshop
 - More days for the regional workshops may be needed to give participants for more to discussion issues at sub-regional level
 - Flexibility needed on the timelines for regional workshops
 - Post2020 consultations should have separate days from Article 8j and SBSTTA-23 meetings in November 2019
 - Some parties need to time to formulate their own opinion and favour a later process
 - Some parties want to engage early
- Pace of work
 - Some parties are concerned about capacity to engage in a heavy process
 - Some parties see this as critical to accomplish result and are ready to invest heavily
- Solution
 - Find the right balance and ensure that core process is fully funded

a. Issues: Costing & Resourcing


- Resourcing the proposed process
 - Costing: cost various element of the proposed process
 - Determine which one will be covered by Cop14 Budget
 - Determine what will need additional resources
 - Parties (e.g. China, Norway, Switzerland) willing to support the process
 - Adequate funding (BZ) for OEWG to enable full and effective participation of Parties

d. Progress

Part 1

- **First planning meeting – 10 to 11 January 2019 in Montreal Canada – Outcome of the meeting: timelines developed; draft discussion paper prepared**
- **Regional consultations have begun, started with the Asia-Pacific in Nagoya, Japan from 28 - 31 January 2019. Some key messages emerged from meeting and includes:**
 - The structure to be adopted... need to look at structure 2030 agenda and other. Integrate post2020 target more with 2030 agenda for sustainable development
 - A new mission is needed, but maintain the long term vision 2050
 - Current Strategic has many targets, some seem not be real targets. Targets for Post2020 should be ambitious but few but easy to under. Capacity building, awareness/communication are cross cutting –should apply to all targets. Indicators needed... develop concurrently with the targets
 - Post2020 framework should be simple to understand by a wide range of stakeholders including policy makers.
 - Need to have linkage between biodiversity and climate change. Resource mobilization, funding, Effective communication, capacity building critical/enablers for implementation.
 - The post2020 framework should integrate the Cartagena and Nagoya Protocol on ABS
 - Pursuing business as usual in the post2020 means loss of biodiversity will increase. Look at what is good in the current strategic plan and keep, review what is not good, link biodiversity to policy and decision-making agenda
- Co-chairs participated in OECD workshop of 26 February through skype and video message
- Draft discussion paper to support the post 2020 process developed
- Website for the post2020 process now operational (www.cbd.int/post2020/). Has provision for updates by Co-chairs.




c. Full Framework Logic Flow (Proposed)




c. From Framework to targets: How Aichi Goals Targets link to Vision ?

1. Context: Co-chairs Explain P2020 process
2. Gather views on key issues from regions
 - a. Break out group
 - b. Report to plenary
3. Explore issues
 - a. Break out group focus on each key issues
 - b. Report to plenary
4. Co-Chairs wrap up and identify gap or questions
 1. Group explore gap / answer questions
 2. Written report back to participants after meeting
