



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Inter-linkage between traditional medicine and biodiversity


- A new terminology but an old practice
- It is the essence of traditional medicine practice in its totality
- One can not talk of TM without referring to biodiversity

Traditional Medicine in its Totality

 Traditional medicine is the sum total of all knowledge and practices, whether explicable or not, used in diagnosing, preventing, and eliminating physical, mental, spiritual or societal imbalances. It relies exclusively on practical experience and observation handed down from generation to generation, verbally, in writing or otherwise (WHO, **1978**).

Traditional Health Practitioner (healer)

- Traditional health practitioner (THP) include; herbalists, spiritualists, bone setters, etc. recognized by the community as competent to provide health care.
- They <u>use Biodiversity</u> based on social, cultural, religious and knowledge, attitudes, and beliefs prevalent in the community regarding physical, mental, spiritual and social well-being, and the believed causes of disease and disability.



Traditional Medicine has its own rationality, its own logic, and its own system.

- Evaluating TM in strictly scientific terms is very limited, inadequate and, at times, impossible, since TM is both material and non-material
- The totality of TM includes therapeutic procedure which takes into account the Physical, Psychological, Ethical, Subtle and Spiritual dimensions of the human being. It may not be reduced to only pharmacopoeia

PROMETRA Uganda

- Founded 2000 to respond to poor health of rural communities through utilization of trad.
 Medicine, indigenous knowledge & science
- Philosophy;
 - Harness nature to promote health
- Has a Trad. Medicine Forest School that brings together traditional healers for Self-Proficiency training to strengthen their capacity, preserve biodiversity resources and influence policy on traditional medicine.

PROMETRA Uganda

- Provides an opportunity to THs to share knowledge and improve their practice to effectively address local health challenges
- University students and authorities, interact, share and understand TM practice within its practitioners' natural environment.

 - Establishment of producer companies, a co-operative style business by local community members in India and Eastern Africa (ICIPE Kenya)
- Self-proficiency training method developed by PROMETRA International
- Protection of community knowledge through;
 - Community Knowledge Registers (CKRs)
 - Bio-cultural community Protocols (BCPs)
 - Databases such as Traditional Knowledge Digital Library (TKDL)

- Self help in Primary Health Care through Home Herbal Gardens in India and Uganda (PROMETRA)
- Participatory documentation, rapid assessment and validation methods of traditional health practices targeting specific community health problems developed in India by FRLHT (Foundation for Revitalization of Local Health Traditions)


Role and Strategies for strengthening Traditional Medicine

- legal framework for practice and use of TM
- Address tensions between therapists due to ideological differences
- Loss of traditional knowledge and practices
- Loss of indigenous species of biodiversity
- Displacement of indigenous species by nonindigenous invasive species
- Traditional health assessment methodologies

Strategies for strengthening TM

- Enhance its integration its knowledge and practices into the development process.
- Support <u>appropriate research and</u> <u>documentation</u> of theories/philosophies and non-pharmacological approaches of the traditional health care system
- Regulatory guidelines to protect both the biodiversity and the local health traditions





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
