✓ DAILY STRATEGY MEETINGS



 Daily schedule, task distribution, Coordination and final proofreading of interventions

<u>INTERVENTIONS</u>

- ✓ INFORMAL DIALOGUE ON SDGs
 - We successfully intervened during the open dialogue, emphasizing that biodiversity issues and specially Aichi targets should be mainstreamed into all SDGs, especially on goal 4 − Education − where biodiversity awareness should be included in all curricula.
 - We also urged parties to ensure full and effective participation of all stakeholders, including frequently marginalized groups: Youth, Women, Indigenous and local communities.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

✓ STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT (18th/Jun)

During COP11 in Hyderabad, GYBN successfully included a paragraph in the COP decision on Stakeholder Engagement, where parties acknowledged the importance of youth and were encouraged to involve youth as active stakeholders in all relevant process on biodiversity.

Hoping to build on this decision, GYBN proposed the development of a strategy on youth engagement in order to strengthen youth participation in the CBD. The proposal was rejected by Norway and the EU that due to the impossibility of the parties having financial commitments with a youth strategy at the moment.



After some commotion during the plenary and an informal dialogue between GYBN, Norway, Germany and CBD ES Mr. Dias. GYBN understood the financial implication of the words in the intervention and decided to take a step-by-step approach, preparing the context, before proposing a strategy on Youth.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

✓ COOPERATION WITH OTHER CONVENTIONS (18th/Jun)

GYBN believes that further cooperation among MEAs needs to be addressed, and we voiced our position during the plenary, urging parties to:

- Enhancing cooperation and coordination in the implementation of Biodiversity related conventions across different government institutions
- Effective information sharing mechanisms to improve synergies between different conventions
- Increase support for joint awareness raising initiatives, such as the Rio Conventions Pavilion and establish new joint work programs and communication strategies between conventions.

- ✓ CLOSING PLENARY (20th/Jun)
 - GYBN stressed the will of young people and their commitment to become active partner of parties and other stakeholders in implementing the Aichi targets and the objectives of the convention. We acknowledged the "Lesson learned" and thanked the support provided by Germany and Japan.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

PARTNERSHIPS & NETWORK

- ✓ NGOs: GYBN further developed its partnership with the CBD Alliance, and we also attended their daily coordination meetings, in order to strategize our interventions and contributions coherently. We also networked with many representatives from different NGOs that shared valuable knowledge/experience with us.
- ✓ PARTIES: GYBN also met with party delegates from Colombia, South Korea, Germany, Norway, India, Japan, Oman and South Africa. We were able to further showcase our network and work on potential future collaborations.
- ✓ CBD Secretariat: GYBN worked closely with the CBD NGO focal points and discussed potential youth actions with Mr. Dias



MAIN ACTIVITIES

✓ JOINT SIDE-EVENT WITH CBD ALLIANCE

The side event focused on how engagement by youth, civil society organizations as well as indigenous peoples and local communities adds value to the CBD-process. It looked at ways and platforms for stakeholders to contribute to the process and present ideas on how stakeholder engagement could be further improved. It also provided insights about obstacles and problems that limits stakeholder participation in the CBD.

After our failed attempt to insert a text on a stakeholder engagement strategy for youth. We discussed the possibility with delegates and proposed a text during SBSTTA 18 on youth engagement in the mainstreaming process of GBO4.

GYBN members were also able to contribute to the discussions on many issues giving 4 interventions during WGRI and 4 interventions during SBSTTA.
